SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 4793

A bill to amend 1974 PA 258, entitled "Mental health code,"

by amending section 434 (MCL 330.1434), as amended by 1995 PA 290.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 434. (1) Any individual 18 years of age or over may file
- 2 with the court a petition that asserts that an individual is a
- 3 person requiring treatment as defined in section 401.
- 4 (2) The petition shall contain the facts that are the basis
- 5 for the assertion, the names and addresses, if known, of any
- 6 witnesses to the facts, and, if known, the name and address of the
- 7 nearest relative or quardian, or, if none, a friend, if known, of
- 8 the individual.

- 1 (3) The petition shall be accompanied by the clinical
- 2 certificate of a physician or a licensed psychologist, unless after
- 3 reasonable effort the petitioner could not secure an examination.
- 4 If a clinical certificate does not accompany the petition, an
- 5 affidavit setting forth the reasons an examination could not be
- 6 secured shall also be filed. The petition may also be accompanied
- 7 by a second clinical certificate. If 2 clinical certificates
- 8 accompany the petition, at least 1 clinical certificate shall have
- 9 been executed by a psychiatrist.
- 10 (4) Except as otherwise provided in section 455, a clinical
- 11 certificate that accompanies a petition shall have been executed
- 12 within 72 hours before the filing of the petition, and after
- 13 personal examination of the individual.
- 14 (5) IF THE INDIVIDUAL IS FOUND NOT TO BE A PERSON REQUIRING
- 15 TREATMENT UNDER THIS SECTION, THE PETITION AND ANY CLINICAL
- 16 CERTIFICATE SHALL BE MAINTAINED BY THE COURT AS A CONFIDENTIAL
- 17 RECORD TO PREVENT DISCLOSURE TO ANY PERSON WHO IS NOT SPECIFICALLY
- 18 AUTHORIZED UNDER THIS CHAPTER TO RECEIVE NOTICE OF THE PETITION OR
- 19 CLINICAL CERTIFICATE.
- 20 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect 90 days
- 21 after the date it is enacted into law.
