- 17 services, or both, are available. Preference shall be given to
- 18 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan
- 19 businesses, if they are competitively priced and of comparable

- 4 Sec. 211. The department shall cooperate with the department
- 5 of technology, management, and budget to maintain a searchable
- 6 website accessible by the public at no cost that includes, but is
- 7 not limited to, all of the following for each department or agency:
- 8 (a) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by category.
- 9 (b) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by appropriation unit.
- (c) Fiscal year-to-date payments to a selected vendor,
- 11 including the vendor name, payment date, payment amount, and
- 12 payment description.
- 13 (d) The number of active department employees by job
- 14 classification.
- 15 (e) Job specifications and wage rates.
- Sec. 212. Within 14 days after the release of the executive
- 17 budget recommendation, the department shall cooperate with the
- 18 state budget office to provide the senate and house appropriations
- 19 chairs, the subcommittees, respectively, and the senate and house
- 20 fiscal agencies with an annual report on estimated state restricted
- 21 fund balances, state restricted fund projected revenues, and state
- 22 restricted fund expenditures for the fiscal years ending September
- 23 30, 2016 and September 30, 2017.
- Sec. 213. The department shall maintain, on a publicly
- 25 accessible website, a department scorecard that identifies, tracks,
- 26 and regularly updates key metrics that are used to monitor and
- improve the agency's performance.

- 1 Sec. 214. Total authorized appropriations from all sources
- 2 under part 1 for legacy costs for the fiscal year ending September
- 3 30, 2017 is \$11,911,300.00. From this amount, total agency
- 4 appropriations for pension-related legacy costs are estimated at
- 5 \$6,604,500.00. Total agency appropriations for retiree health care
- 6 legacy costs are estimated at \$5,306,800.00.
- 7 Sec. 215. The department shall not take disciplinary action
- 8 against an employee for communicating with a member of the
- 9 legislature or his or her staff.
- 10 Sec. 233. In addition to the metrics required under section
- 11 447 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1447, for
- 12 each new program or program enhancement for which funds in excess
- of \$500,000.00 are appropriated in part 1, the department shall
- 14 provide not later than November 1, 2016 a list of program-specific
- 15 metrics intended to measure its performance based on a return on
- 16 taxpayer investment. The department shall deliver the program-
- 17 specific metrics to members of the senate and house subcommittees
- 18 that have subject matter jurisdiction for this budget, fiscal
- 19 agencies, and the state budget director. The department shall
- 20 provide an update on its progress in tracking program-specific
- 21 metrics and the status of program success at an appropriations

- 3 Sec. 301. (1) The department may establish a fee schedule and
- 4 collect fees for the following work activities and services:
- 5 (a) Pesticide and plant pest management propagation and
- 6 certification of virus-free foundation stock.
- 7 (b) Fruit and vegetable inspection and grading services at
- 8 shipping and termination points and processing plants.
- 9 (c) Laboratory support testing for testing horses in draft
- 10 horse pulling contests at county fairs when local jurisdictions
- 11 request state assistance.
- 12 (d) Laboratory support analyses to determine foreign
- 13 substances in horses engaged in racing or pulling contests at
- 14 tracks.
- 15 (e) Laboratory support analyses of food, livestock, and
- 16 agricultural products for disease, foreign products for disease,
- 17 toxic materials, foreign substances, and quality standards.
- 18 (f) Laboratory support test samples for other state and local
- 19 agencies and public or private organizations.
- 20 (2) The department may receive and expend revenue from the
- 21 fees authorized under subsection (1), subject to appropriation, for
- 22 the purpose of recovering expenses associated with the work
- 23 activities and services described in subsection (1). Fee revenue
- 24 collected by the department under subsection (1) shall not lapse to
- 25 the state general fund at the end of the fiscal year but shall

- 13 (2) The report shall include information on significant
- 14 foodborne outbreaks and emergencies, including any enforcement
- 15 actions taken related to food safety during the prior calendar
- 16 year.
- 17 (3) The report shall be transmitted to the subcommittees and
- 18 the fiscal agencies and posted to the department's website on or
- 19 before April 1 of each year.
- 20 Sec. 403. It is the intent of the legislature that the
- 21 department work with the FDA and representatives of agriculture
- 22 producers to develop on-farm food safety education and training

- 15 (b) The amount of the indemnification.
- 16 (c) The person to whom the indemnification was paid.
- 17 Sec. 454. The department shall use its resources to
- 18 collaborate with the USDA to monitor bovine TB, consistent with the
- 19 May 2014 memorandum of understanding between the department and the
- 20 USDA.
- 21 Sec. 457. (1) On or before October 15, 2016, the department
- 22 shall provide to the subcommittees and the fiscal agencies a report

- 12 and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.8701 to
- 13 324.8717, and technical assistance in implementing conservation
- 14 grants available under the federal farm bill of 2014.
- 15 Sec. 602. The department shall report on the previous calendar

- 24 fund shall be expended for nonequine-related purposes without prior
- 25 approval of the legislature.
- 26 Sec. 802. All appropriations from the agriculture equine

- 1 industry development fund, except for the Michigan gaming control
- 2 board's regulatory expenses and the department's expenses to
