- 21 state restricted fund projected revenues, and state restricted fund
- 22 expenditures for the preceeding and current fiscal years.
- 23 Sec. 230. The department shall maintain, on a publicly
- 24 accessible website, a department scorecard that identifies, tracks,
- 25 and regularly updates key metrics that are used to monitor and
- 26 improve the department's performance.
- Sec. 232. The department shall serve as an active liaison

- 1 between the DTMB and state, local, regional, and federal public
- 2 safety agencies on matters pertaining to the Michigan public safety
- 3 communications system and shall report user issues to the DTMB.
- 4 Sec. 233. Total authorized appropriations from all sources
- 5 under part 1 for legacy costs for the fiscal year ending September
- 6 30, 2016 are \$123,378,400.00. From this amount, total agency
- 7 appropriations for pension-related legacy costs are estimated at
- **8** \$67,221,200.00, and total agency appropriations for retiree health
- 9 care legacy costs are estimated at \$56,157,300.00.
- 10 Sec. 235. The department shall initiate discussions with the
- 11 city of Wayland regarding a potential partnership between the city
- 12 and the department for a joint public safety building located in
- 13 the city.
