SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 5247

A bill to amend 1949 PA 300, entitled "Michigan vehicle code,"

by amending section 698 (MCL 257.698), as amended by 2012 PA 262.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 698. (1) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more
- 2 than 2 side cowl or fender lamps that shall emit an amber or white
- 3 light without glare.
- 4 (2) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more than 1
- 5 running board courtesy lamp on each side that shall emit a white or
- 6 amber light without glare.
- 7 (3) Backing lights of red, amber, or white may be mounted on
- 8 the rear of a motor vehicle if the switch controlling the light is
- 9 so arranged that the light may be turned on only if the vehicle is

- 1 in reverse gear. The backing lights when unlighted shall be covered
- 2 or otherwise arranged so as not to reflect objectionable glare in
- 3 the eyes of an operator of a vehicle approaching from the rear.
- 4 (4) Unless both covered and unlit, a vehicle operated on the
- 5 highways of this state shall not be equipped with a lamp or a part
- 6 designed to be a reflector unless expressly required or permitted
- 7 by this chapter or that meets the standards prescribed in 49 CFR
- 8 571.108. A lamp or a part designed to be a reflector, if visible
- 9 from the front, shall display or reflect a white or amber light; if
- 10 visible from either side, shall display or reflect an amber or red
- 11 light; and if visible from the rear, shall display or reflect a red
- 12 light, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 13 (5) The use or possession of flashing, oscillating, or
- 14 rotating lights of any color is prohibited except as otherwise
- 15 provided by law, or under the following circumstances:
- 16 (a) A police vehicle shall be equipped with flashing,
- 17 rotating, or oscillating red or blue lights, for use in the
- 18 performance of police duties.
- 19 (b) A fire vehicle or ambulance available for public use or
- 20 for use of the United States, the state, or any unit of the state,
- 21 whether publicly or privately owned, shall be equipped with
- 22 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights and used as required
- 23 for safety.
- 24 (c) An authorized emergency vehicle may be equipped with
- 25 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights for use when
- 26 responding to an emergency call if when in use the flashing,
- 27 rotating, or oscillating red lights are mounted on the roof section

- 1 of the vehicle, either as a permanent installation or by means of
- 2 suction cups or magnets and are clearly visible in a 360-degree arc
- 3 from a distance of 500 feet when in use. A person operating lights
- 4 under this subdivision at any time other than when responding to an
- 5 emergency call is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 6 (d) Flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber OR GREEN lights,
- 7 placed in a position as to be visible throughout an arc of 360
- 8 degrees, shall be used by a state, county, or municipal vehicle
- 9 engaged in the removal of ice, snow, or other material from the
- 10 highway and in other operations designed to control ice and snow,
- 11 OR ENGAGED IN OTHER NON-WINTER OPERATIONS. THIS SUBDIVISION DOES
- 12 NOT PROHIBIT THE USE OF A FLASHING, ROTATING, OR OSCILLATING GREEN
- 13 LIGHT BY A FIRE SERVICE.
- 14 (e) A vehicle used for the cleanup of spills or a necessary
- 15 emergency response action taken pursuant to state or federal law or
- 16 a vehicle operated by an employee of the department of natural
- 17 resources OR THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY that responds
- 18 to a spill, emergency response action, complaint, or compliance
- 19 activity may be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating
- 20 amber OR GREEN lights. Such THE lights DESCRIBED IN THIS
- 21 SUBDIVISION shall not be activated unless the vehicle is at the
- 22 scene of a spill, emergency response action, complaint, or
- 23 compliance activity. THIS SUBDIVISION DOES NOT PROHIBIT THE USE OF
- 24 A FLASHING, ROTATING, OR OSCILLATING GREEN LIGHT BY A FIRE SERVICE.
- 25 (f) A vehicle to perform public utility service, a vehicle
- 26 owned or leased by and licensed as a business for use in the
- 27 collection and hauling of refuse, an automobile service car or

- 1 wrecker, a vehicle engaged in authorized highway repair or
- 2 maintenance, a vehicle of a peace officer, a vehicle operated by a
- 3 rural letter carrier or a person under contract to deliver
- 4 newspapers or other publications by motor route, a vehicle utilized
- 5 for snow or ice removal under section 682c, a private security
- 6 quard vehicle as authorized in subsection (7), a motor vehicle
- 7 while engaged in escorting or transporting an oversize load that
- 8 has been issued a permit by the state transportation department or
- 9 a local authority with respect to highways under its jurisdiction,
- 10 a vehicle owned by the national guard or a United States military
- 11 vehicle while traveling under the appropriate recognized military
- 12 authority, a motor vehicle while towing an implement of husbandry,
- 13 or an implement of husbandry may be equipped with flashing,
- 14 rotating, or oscillating amber lights. However, a wrecker may be
- 15 equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights that
- 16 shall be activated only when the wrecker is engaged in removing or
- 17 assisting a vehicle at the scene of a traffic accident or
- 18 disablement. The flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights
- 19 shall not be activated except when the warning produced by the
- 20 lights is required for public safety.
- 21 (g) A vehicle engaged in leading or escorting a funeral
- 22 procession or any vehicle that is part of a funeral procession may
- 23 be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating purple or amber
- 24 lights that shall not be activated except during a funeral
- 25 procession.
- 26 (h) An authorized emergency vehicle may display flashing,
- 27 rotating, or oscillating white lights in conjunction with an

- 1 authorized emergency light as prescribed in this section.
- 2 (i) A private motor vehicle of a physician responding to an
- 3 emergency call may be equipped with and the physician may use
- 4 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights mounted on the roof
- 5 section of the vehicle either as a permanent installation or by
- 6 means of magnets or suction cups and clearly visible in a 360-
- 7 degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. The physician
- 8 shall first obtain written authorization from the county sheriff.
- 9 (j) A public transit vehicle may be equipped with a flashing,
- 10 oscillating, or rotating light mounted on the roof of the vehicle
- 11 approximately 6 feet from the rear of the vehicle that displays a
- 12 white light to the front, side, and rear of the vehicle, which
- 13 light may be actuated by the driver for use only in inclement
- 14 weather such as fog, rain, or snow, when boarding or discharging
- 15 passengers, from 1/2 hour before sunset until 1/2 hour after
- 16 sunrise, or when conditions hinder the visibility of the public
- 17 transit vehicle. As used in this subdivision, "public transit
- 18 vehicle" means a motor vehicle, other than a station wagon or
- 19 passenger van, with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than
- 20 10,000 pounds.
- 21 (k) A person engaged in the manufacture, sale, or repair of
- 22 flashing, rotating, or oscillating lights governed by this
- 23 subsection may possess the lights for the purpose of employment,
- 24 but shall not activate the lights upon the highway unless
- 25 authorized to do so under subsection (6).
- 26 (6) A person shall not sell, loan, or otherwise furnish a
- 27 flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or red light designed

- 1 primarily for installation on an authorized emergency vehicle to a
- 2 person except a police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, authorized
- 3 physician, volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambulance
- 4 driver, licensed ambulance driver or attendant of the state, a
- 5 county or municipality within the state, a person engaged in the
- 6 business of operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a
- 7 federally recognized nonprofit charitable organization that owns
- 8 and operates an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 9 emergencies. This subsection does not prohibit an authorized
- 10 vehicle, equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or
- 11 red lights, from being operated by a person other than a person
- 12 described in this section if the person receives authorization to
- 13 operate the emergency vehicle from a police officer, sheriff,
- 14 deputy sheriff, authorized physician, volunteer or paid fire
- 15 fighter, volunteer ambulance driver, licensed ambulance driver or
- 16 attendant, a person operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a
- 17 federally recognized nonprofit charitable organization that owns
- 18 and operates an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 19 emergencies, except that the authorization shall not permit the
- 20 person to operate lights as described in subsection (5)(a), (b),
- 21 (c), (i), or (j), or to exercise the privileges described in
- 22 section 603. A person who operates an authorized emergency vehicle
- 23 in violation of the terms of an authorization is guilty of a
- 24 misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for not more than 90 days or
- a fine of not more than \$100.00, or both.
- 26 (7) A private motor vehicle of a security guard agency or
- 27 alarm company licensed under the private security business and

- 1 security alarm act, 1968 PA 330, MCL 338.1051 to 338.1092, may
- 2 display flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights. The
- 3 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights shall not be
- 4 activated on a public highway when a vehicle is in motion.
- 5 (8) This section does not prohibit, restrict, or limit the use
- 6 of lights authorized or required under sections 697, 697a, and
- **7** 698a.
- 8 (9) A person who operates a vehicle in violation of subsection
- 9 (1), (2), (3), or (4) is responsible for a civil infraction.
- 10 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect 90 days
- 11 after the date it is enacted into law.
