Senate Bill 1134 (as reported without amendment)

## **CONTENT**

The bill would amend the Guardianship Assistance Act to require the approval process for guardianship assistance to include criminal record checks, child abuse and child neglect central registry checks, and fingerprint-based criminal record checks on a successor quardian and all adults living in the successor quardian's home.

Under the Act, subject to certain requirements, a quardian who meets all of the following may receive quardianship assistance on behalf of an eligible child:

- -- The guardian is the eligible child's relative or legal custodian.
- -- The eligible child has resided with the prospective guardian in his or her residence for at least six months before the application for assistance is received by the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS).

The quardian also must be a licensed foster parent and approved for quardianship assistance by the DHHS. The approval process must include criminal record checks and child abuse and neglect central registry checks on the quardian and all adults living in his or her home, as well as fingerprint-based criminal record checks on the quardian. If the quardian's fingerprints are stored in the automated fingerprint identification system (AFIS), the DHHS must use those fingerprints for the criminal record check. The bill would eliminate the provision related to AFIS.

Instead, the approval process would have to include criminal record checks and child abuse and child neglect central registry checks on the quardian, all successor quardians, and all adults living in the guardian's or successor quardian's home, as well as fingerprint-based criminal record checks on the guardian or successor guardian.

"Guardian" means a person appointed by the court to act as a legal guardian for a child under Section 19a or 19c of the juvenile code. "Successor guardian" means a person appointed by the court to act as a legal guardian when the preceding guardian is no longer able to act as a result of his or her death or incapacitation under Section 19a or 19c of the juvenile code, and does not include a person appointed as a quardian if that person's parental rights to the child have been terminated or suspended.
