#### Overview

The Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development's (MDARD) key programs and priorities include ensuring food safety and security, protecting animal health and welfare, managing invasive exotic species, regulating pesticide use, certifying agricultural commodities, ensuring environmental stewardship, consumer protection, and promoting the state's agricultural economy.

Executive had included \$4.0 million GF/GP in its FY 2019-20 budget request: \$2.0 million as ongoing, and \$2.0 million as one-time. The intention was to expend the Double Up Food Bucks program to additional counties in Michigan, and to increase the number of participating retailers in the counties where the program is currently established. Double Up Food Bucks increases purchasing power of Michigan residents who receive Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits by providing a dollar-for-dollar match of up to \$20 per day to buy fresh fruits and vegetables at participating grocery stores and farmer's markets. Funding would be granted to the Fair Food Network, a private non-profit organization that directly administers the program.

The Executive subsequently included \$2.0 million GF/GP in a current year supplemental request (included in Senate Bill 150, as passed by the Senate on April 25, 2019) which would replace the \$2.0 million in one-time funding proposed for FY 2019-20.

Senate includes \$2.0 million GF/GP (ongoing) for Double Up Food Bucks.

# Major Boilerplate Changes From FY 2018-19

# Sec. 215. Communication with the Legislature – RETAINED

<u>Senate</u> retains section that prohibits department from taking disciplinary action against an employee for communicating with the legislature.

# Sec. 234. Record Retention - RETAINED

<u>Senate</u> retains section that requires department to retain reports funded from part 1 appropriations; specifies record retention guidelines.

#### Major Boilerplate Changes From FY 2018-19

## Sec. 451. Bovine TB Whole-Herd Testing - RETAINED

<u>Senate</u> retains section that requires department to pay for the costs of whole-herd testing and individual animal testing in the Modified Accredited Zone, including indemnity and compensation for animal injury.

## Sec. 457. Bovine TB Quarterly Report - RETAINED

Senate retains current specific reporting requirements related to Bovine TB program.

#### Sec. 459. Bovine TB Testing, Legislative Intent – RETAINED

<u>Senate</u> retains section that expresses legislative intent that department not conduct whole-herd testing of any one herd in a TB-free zone more often than once every four years, except under specific conditions.

#### Sec. 462. Apiary Protection – DELETED

Senate does not include \$20,000 earmark for an apiary protection program.

# Sec. 604. Authorization to Receive and Expend Federal Funds - DELETED

<u>Senate</u> deletes language that authorizes the department to receive and expend federal funds in excess of line item appropriations for environmental stewardship and MAEAP programs.

## Sec. 802. Agriculture Equine Industry Development Fund (AEIDF) - MODIFIED

<u>Senate</u> modifies current year language prescribing priority order of AEIDF expenditures; deletes earmark for Purses and supplements, licensed tracks.

## Sec. 805. County Fair Capital Grant Program - MODIFIED

<u>Executive</u> revises language governing matching program for county fair capital grants program. Revised to reflect new matching requirements; deletes current year earmarks. <u>Senate</u> concurs with Executive, but also adds a \$50,000 earmark for the promotion of festivals and events.

### Sec. 901. Local Conservation District Pilot Program – NEW

<u>Senate</u> includes boilerplate section defining use of a \$3.0 million one-time appropriation. The section indicates that the appropriation for conservation districts pilot project must be distributed in equal amounts to each conservation district in the state, to be used to develop a natural resources assessment, an assessment to describe the conservation district and to identify the top 5 natural resources needs for each district; provides for a report by September 30, 2020.
