BIRTH CERTIFICATE FEE WAIVER FOR HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS

House Bill 4853 as introduced Sponsor: Rep. Tommy Brann Committee: Appropriations Complete to 8-30-2019

SUMMARY:

House Bill 4853 would amend Part 28 of the Public Health Code regarding Vital Records. The bill would allow for a waiver of the statutory fee of \$34 for the state registrar to provide a copy of a certified vital record to a homeless individual. The individual would first be required to provide written verification of homelessness from a public service agency and photo identification generated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development Homeless Management Information System.

The bill would also make a technical revision to language permitting a charter county to adopt a system of vital records fees for a local registrar under the county's jurisdiction, so that the provision would apply to a charter county with a population of 1.5 million or more, rather than 2 million or more. The statutory language applies to Wayne County, and the bill would update the statute to reflect that the current population of the county is below 2 million.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The proposed Fiscal Year 2019-20 DHHS budget includes an additional \$226,000 GF/GP to provide funding that would not be collected because of a waiver of state and local vital records fee for a certified copy of a birth certificate to a homeless individual who is not in possession of a copy. The House-passed and Senate-passed budget bills for DHHS have included this amount, which was originally proposed in the Executive Budget Recommendation. Of these funds, \$136,000 would cover state vital records agency costs, and \$90,000 would be used to reimburse homeless service agencies that pay county vital records fees on behalf of a homeless client.

The forgone state revenue would be \$34 for each state search and copy provided to a homeless individual, and an additional \$12 when the copy is provided in an expedited manner. The Michigan Coalition Against Homelessness indicates that, of agencies completing a 2017 survey of the Coalition, over 5,200 homeless persons were assisted annually with obtaining birth certificates. The proposed appropriation provides funding to

cover costs for up to 8,000 birth certificates, primarily through local county clerk offices where locally set fees range from \$10 to \$26.

The bill's proposed change for provisions applying to a charter county of 1.5 million or more rather than 2 million or more would have no fiscal impact.
