

PART 2

PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

**GENERAL SECTIONS**

13 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state  
14 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources under  
15 part 1 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020 is \$0.00 and  
16 total state spending from state sources to be paid to local units  
17 of government is \$0.00.

18 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized  
19 under this part and part 1 and the departments, commissions,  
20 boards, offices, and programs for which appropriations are made  
21 under this part and part 1, are subject to the management and  
22 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

23 Sec. 203. If the state administrative board, acting under  
24 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount  
25 appropriated under this act, the legislature may, by a concurrent  
26 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and  
27 serving in each house, inter-transfer funds within this act for the  
28 particular department, board, commission, office, or institution.

29 Sec. 204. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 are subject to



1 applicable federal audit and reporting requirements. Prompt action  
2 shall be taken if instances of noncompliance are identified,  
3 including noncompliance identified in an audit finding. If any  
4 instance of noncompliance is identified, including noncompliance  
5 identified in an audit finding, the state budget director shall  
6 take necessary and immediate action to rectify it. The state budget  
7 director shall notify the senate and house appropriations  
8 committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies when an  
9 instance of noncompliance is identified.

10 (2) In a form and manner determined by the recipient  
11 department, all eligible sub-recipients receiving funds through  
12 this act must comply with all requirements corresponding to the  
13 receipt of funds required in the coronavirus aid, relief, and  
14 economic security act, Public Law 116-136, and Uniform Guidance, 2  
15 CFR 200, as applicable, including, but not limited to, any  
16 certifications, assurances, and accountability and transparency  
17 provisions. The department responsible for administering federal  
18 funds may require any documentation necessary to ensure compliance  
19 with federal requirements.

20 (3) Any funds received under this act and expended by a sub-  
21 recipient in any manner that does not adhere to the coronavirus  
22 aid, relief, and economic security act, Public Law 116-136, or  
23 Uniform Guidance, 2 CFR 200, as applicable, shall be returned to  
24 the state. If it is determined that a sub-recipient receiving funds  
25 under this act expends any funds received under this act for a  
26 purpose that is not consistent with the requirements of the  
27 coronavirus aid, relief, and economic security act, Public Law 116-  
28 136, or Uniform Guidance, 2 CFR 200, as applicable, the state  
29 budget director is authorized to withhold payment of state funds,



1 in part or in whole, payable from any state appropriation.

2 Sec. 205. The state budget director shall report on the status  
3 of funds appropriated in part 1, and all funds appropriated related  
4 to the coronavirus relief effort, to the senate and house  
5 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies  
6 on a monthly basis until all funds are exhausted.

7  
8 **DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT**

9 Sec. 251. Funds appropriated in part 1 for double up food  
10 bucks may only be used for increasing subsidies to eligible  
11 recipients and may not be used for program administration costs.

12  
13 **DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

14 Sec. 301. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for child  
15 care rate reduction stipend, the department of education shall  
16 create a child care rate reduction stipend as an add-on to the  
17 child care relief fund grant to reduce child care costs to  
18 families. All licensed child care providers that receive grants  
19 from the child care relief fund are eligible to receive the  
20 additional child care rate reduction stipend. Providers are  
21 eligible to receive stipends to cover the months of June, July, and  
22 August in the current fiscal year and will have up to 30 days after  
23 the charged month to apply for a child care rate reduction stipend.

24 (2) At the time of application, licensed providers shall  
25 provide information on the amount of tuition charged to families.  
26 The department of education shall reimburse the provider up to 30%  
27 of the tuition amount charged to the family for each child cared  
28 for by the provider for the months of June, July, and August in the  
29 current fiscal year. Recipients of the child care rate reduction



1 stipend must reduce their rates by the rate reimbursement  
2 percentage described in this section. The stipend is intended to  
3 cover that percentage of a parent's tuition, thus reducing the  
4 amount charged to the family. In addition to receiving the stipend,  
5 the provider must ensure that they meet the requirements of the  
6 child care relief fund for each month the provider received a child  
7 care relief fund grant. The weekly rate charged to families cannot  
8 be higher than the rate charged prior to the state of emergency in  
9 March 2020.

10 (3) As a condition of receiving a child care relief fund  
11 grant, child care providers are required to reduce the monthly  
12 billed amount to the family of each child by the amount received  
13 for each child. If the department of education determines that the  
14 provider did not provide the required tuition reduction, the  
15 department of education shall recoup the funds.

16 (4) The department of education shall take reasonable steps to  
17 distribute the child care reduction stipend within 15 business days  
18 of receiving an application from a provider unless the provider  
19 fails to meet the requirements of this section. The department of  
20 education shall provide notice and information to all licensed  
21 providers on how to apply for the stipend and the requirements of  
22 the program. The department of education shall take reasonable  
23 steps to ensure that providers apply for a child care rate  
24 reduction stipend. Providers shall be required to maintain all  
25 billing and refund records for a minimum of 4 years for auditing  
26 purposes.

27 (5) If the funds allocated for the child care rate reduction  
28 stipend are insufficient to fully fund payments under subsection  
29 (2), the department of education shall prorate payments under



1 subsection (2).

2 (6) As used in this section, "licensed providers" includes  
3 licensed child care centers, licensed group homes, licensed family  
4 homes, and disaster relief child care centers.

5 Sec. 302. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for  
6 district COVID-19 costs, the department of education shall allocate  
7 funding statewide to districts to support instructional recovery  
8 programming, benchmark assessments, or health and safety  
9 expenditures necessary to provide instruction safely due to COVID-  
10 19. An instructional recovery program eligible for funding under  
11 this section is one specifically designed to enable students to  
12 catch up and resume learning that was interrupted due to the COVID-  
13 19 outbreak. Funding shall be allocated to all districts by July  
14 30, 2020 on an equal per-pupil basis, based on the number of pupils  
15 in membership in each district in 2019-2020.

16 (2) As used in this section, "district" means that definition  
17 as described in section 3 of the state school aid act of 1979, 1979  
18 PA 94, MCL 388.1603, and includes a public school academy.

20 **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

21 Sec. 401. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-  
22 19 direct care worker hazard pay adjustment, the department of  
23 health and human services shall provide sufficient funding to  
24 increase the wages paid to direct care workers described in  
25 subsection (2) by \$2.00 per hour above the rates paid on March 1,  
26 2020 beginning July 1, 2020 through September 30, 2020.

27 (2) The direct care wage increase shall be provided to direct  
28 care workers employed by the department of health and human  
29 services, its contractors, and its subcontractors who received a



1 \$2.00 per hour state-funded wage increase beginning in April 2020.  
2 The total combined direct care wage increases from the April 2020  
3 direct care wage increase and the wage increase outlined in this  
4 section shall be \$2.00 per hour and shall be in effect from April  
5 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020.

6 (3) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19 direct  
7 care worker hazard pay adjustment, a direct care wage increase of  
8 \$2.00 per hour shall be provided to direct care workers employed by  
9 skilled nursing facilities on the effective date of this act,  
10 beginning July 1, 2020 and continuing until September 30, 2020.  
11 This funding shall include all costs incurred by the employer,  
12 including payroll taxes, due to the \$2.00 per hour increase. As  
13 used in this subsection, "direct care workers" means a registered  
14 nurse, licensed practical nurse, competency-evaluated nursing  
15 assistant, and respiratory therapist.

16 (4) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19 direct  
17 care worker hazard pay adjustment, a direct care wage increase of  
18 \$2.00 per hour shall be provided to direct care workers employed by  
19 area agencies on aging and its contractors for in-home and respite  
20 services on the effective date of this act, beginning July 1, 2020  
21 and continuing until September 30, 2020. This funding shall include  
22 all costs incurred by the employer, including payroll taxes, due to  
23 the \$2.00 per hour increase.

24 (5) Contractors and subcontractors receiving funding to  
25 support these direct care wage increases shall be required to  
26 provide documentation of the wage increases provided pursuant to  
27 this section to the department of health and human services.

28 (6) Any payment enhancement above the hourly rate in effect on  
29 March 1, 2020 shall be of no effect in determining any employee's



1 average compensation as provided by any contract or other provision  
2 of law.

3 (7) A direct care worker may elect to not receive the wage  
4 increase provided in this section. The election to not receive the  
5 wage increase in this section must be made either in writing or  
6 electronically. The employer of a direct care worker who has  
7 elected to not receive the wage increase in this section must remit  
8 back to the state any of the funds authorized by this section based  
9 on the number of direct care workers it employs who have elected to  
10 not receive the wage increase authorized by this section.

11 Sec. 402. The funds appropriated in part 1 for inpatient  
12 behavioral health grants shall be distributed in a manner that is  
13 consistent with a \$100.00 per diem increase to the inpatient  
14 psychiatric hospital rate adjustment (HRA) program received in the  
15 first quarter of 2020 through the Medicaid prepaid inpatient health  
16 plans. Hospitals that provide inpatient psychiatric treatment shall  
17 use these funds for necessary expenditures incurred as a result of  
18 COVID-19.

19 Sec. 403. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for victim  
20 services continuity and stability grants shall be administered by  
21 the department of health and human services, designated to the  
22 Michigan domestic and sexual violence prevention and treatment  
23 board, to support the continuing and expanded provision of victim  
24 services through the period of disruption and increased workload  
25 caused by COVID-19. Grants shall be awarded to organizations that  
26 provide victim services for victims of domestic violence, sexual  
27 assault, and stalking. Victim services organizations shall use  
28 grant funding for any of the following:

29 (a) Personal protection equipment (PPE), including N-95 masks,



1 shields, gloves, sanitizer, signage, and other similar equipment.

2 (b) Telehealth technology and equipment.

3 (c) Provision of mental health and trauma recovery services.

4 (d) Emergency or temporary housing and shelter, including, but  
5 not limited to, using hotels for temporary shelter, expanding  
6 shelter capacity, and decreasing shelter density via other  
7 temporary or permanent means.

8 (e) Housing-related assistance, including, but not limited to,  
9 1 or more of the following:

10 (i) Financial assistance, including security deposits, utility  
11 payments and setup costs, moving and storage cost assistance, and  
12 rental assistance.

13 (ii) Housing stabilization assistance, including case  
14 management, relocation assistance, outreach and engagement,  
15 landlord recruitment, housing navigation and placement, and credit  
16 repair.

17 (iii) Other services and support for homeless victims or victims  
18 who are at risk of homelessness.

19 (f) Employment assistance and job skills training.

20 (g) Safety planning and safety-related assistance.

21 (h) Financial assistance, including, but not limited to, the  
22 provision of prepaid phones and laptops, food or food costs, home  
23 security upgrades, funeral and burial costs for homicide victims,  
24 and assistance meeting other basic needs.

25 (i) Case management.

26 (j) Civil legal services.

27 (k) Substance use disorder treatment services.

28 (l) Services to support victims who are voluntarily engaging in  
29 restorative practices.



1 (m) Medical services or expenses, and medical or health-  
2 related services or expenses.

3 (n) Other services to support victims in their recovery as  
4 outlined in the grant request.

5 (2) The Michigan domestic and sexual violence prevention and  
6 treatment board shall award grants to organizations that have a  
7 current state contract awarded through the Michigan domestic and  
8 sexual violence prevention and treatment board. Federally  
9 recognized tribes providing services consistent with this section  
10 are also eligible. Grant awards shall be capped at a maximum amount  
11 of not more than \$50,000.00. Not less than \$950,000.00 shall be  
12 awarded to child advocacy centers.

13 (3) Not later than September 30, 2020, the department of  
14 health and human services shall provide a report to the senate and  
15 house appropriations committees, the senate and house fiscal  
16 agencies, and the state budget office on the number of grant  
17 applications received, the number of grants awarded, and the amount  
18 of each grant awarded by county.

19 (4) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for victim  
20 services continuity and stability grants are designated as a work  
21 project appropriation. Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall  
22 not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for  
23 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects  
24 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section  
25 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL  
26 18.1451a:

27 (a) The purpose of the work project is to support the  
28 continuing and expanded provision of victim services for victims of  
29 domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, through the period



1 of disruption caused by COVID-19.

2 (b) The projects will be accomplished by utilizing state  
3 employees or by contracts.

4 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is  
5 \$5,000,000.00.

6 (d) The tentative completion date is December 30, 2020.

7 Sec. 404. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for water  
8 utility assistance, the department of health and human services  
9 shall create a residential emergency relief program to provide  
10 direct payment assistance for all water and wastewater utilities  
11 designed to help households retain water service as an essential  
12 public health method of mitigating the spread of COVID-19.

13 (2) The department of health and human services shall make  
14 payments to water utility providers to reimburse them for providing  
15 bill forgiveness for all arrearages and fees incurred by  
16 residential water customers during the COVID-19 state of emergency  
17 and for providing a 25% discount on the total water bill for  
18 eligible customers through the end of December 2020. Maximum  
19 reimbursement for each arrearage is \$700.00.

20 (3) To receive funds under this section, the local water  
21 utility provider must agree to all of the following:

22 (a) Not to shut off water service to residential customers in  
23 the program for a minimum of 90 days beyond the date the customer  
24 receives water utility assistance.

25 (b) Forgive 25% of the amount billed in water service bills,  
26 sent to residential customers before December 1, 2020, for eligible  
27 residential water customers.

28 (c) Take no action that affects the household's credit score  
29 or pursue any type of collection action against the water customer.



1 (d) Notify the client of discount provided and bill  
2 forgiveness.

3 (e) Provide the benefits reimbursed under this section in  
4 addition to any assistance provided through a provider's local  
5 water utility assistance program.

6 (4) To be eligible, a residential water service customer must  
7 be eligible for the food assistance program and must have  
8 accumulated new arrearages or fees after March 1, 2020 and during  
9 the COVID-19 state of emergency order.

10 (5) The department of health and human services may use the  
11 services of community assistance providers to implement the program  
12 and allow them to retain up to 4% for administrative expenses.

13 (6) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for water  
14 utility assistance are designated as a work project appropriation.  
15 Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of  
16 the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for  
17 projects under this section until the projects have been completed.  
18 The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the  
19 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

20 (a) The purpose of the work project is to reimburse water  
21 utility providers for providing bill forgiveness for arrearages and  
22 fees incurred by residential water customers during the COVID-19  
23 state of emergency and for providing a 25% discount on the total  
24 water bill for eligible customers through the end of December 2020.

25 (b) The projects will be accomplished by utilizing state  
26 employees or by contracts.

27 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is  
28 \$25,000,000.00.

29 (d) The tentative completion date is December 30, 2020.



1           Sec. 405. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for  
2 personal protection equipment grants, the department of health and  
3 human services shall create the personal protection equipment  
4 support and testing program to provide grants to the following  
5 priority providers:

6           (a) Long-term care facilities.

7           (b) Dialysis facilities.

8           (c) Outpatient facilities collecting diagnostic respiratory  
9 specimens.

10          (d) Dental facilities.

11          (e) Other outpatient facilities.

12          (f) Home health care.

13          (g) Long-term acute care hospitals.

14          (h) Emergency medical service providers.

15          (i) Pharmacies.

16          (j) Funeral directors and mortuary services.

17          (k) Residential congregate facilities.

18          (2) The personal protection equipment support and testing  
19 program shall include grants for personal protection equipment,  
20 COVID-19 testing, and COVID-19 testing equipment. The grants shall  
21 be applied for and disbursed in the most efficient form and manner  
22 determined by the department of health and human services.

23          (3) The personal protection equipment support and testing  
24 program grants shall be available for personal protection  
25 equipment, COVID-19 testing, and COVID-19 testing equipment  
26 purchased on or after March 1, 2020 in response to COVID-19.

27          (4) The department of health and human services shall provide  
28 a report to the senate and house appropriations committees, the  
29 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office that



1 includes, at a minimum, the number of grant applications received,  
2 the number of grants awarded, and a listing of individual grantees  
3 by county. The report shall be provided not later than September  
4 30, 2020.

5

6 **DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY**

7 Sec. 501. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for unemployment  
8 insurance agency shall be used by the department of labor and  
9 economic opportunity, in coordination with other approved funds, to  
10 increase capacity by an estimated 500 term-limited employees or  
11 contractors for up to 6 months, and to purchase software,  
12 equipment, and other supplies necessary for processing unemployment  
13 claims, reducing backlogs and time lags, providing customer service  
14 to claimants, and any other allowable use under federal guidelines.

15 (2) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for  
16 unemployment insurance agency are designated as a work project  
17 appropriation. Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse  
18 at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for  
19 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects  
20 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section  
21 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL  
22 18.1451a:

23 (a) The purpose of the work project is to increase capacity by  
24 an estimated 500 term-limited employees or contractors for up to 6

6 Sec. 604. (1) From the funds appropriated under part 1 for  
7 local units of government, the department of treasury shall make  
8 payments to counties, cities, villages, and townships, other than  
9 those that received a direct allocation from the coronavirus aid,  
10 relief, and economic security act, Public Law 116-136, to reimburse  
11 them for eligible public safety and public health payroll  
12 expenditures under the coronavirus aid, relief, and economic  
13 security act, Public Law 116-136.

14 (2) To receive funds under this act, not later than July 17, a  
15 local unit of government must submit, in a form and manner  
16 described by the department of treasury, their eligible public  
17 safety and public health payroll expenditures incurred for the  
18 months of April and May. Any submissions received by the department  
19 of treasury after the due date for submission shall not receive a  
20 distribution under this subsection but shall be considered for any  
21 possible distributions under subsection (3). The department of  
22 treasury shall determine each local unit's allocation based on the  
23 local unit of government's expenditures submitted. If eligible

18 Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of

21 The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the

23 (a) The purpose of the work project is to reimburse local

27 (b) The projects will be accomplished by utilizing state  
28 employees or by contracts.

29 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is
