THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 CHAPTER XVI
2 Sec. 2. A person is not subject to criminal prosecution for
3 the breaking or entry into a motor vehicle, or for the resulting
4 damage to that motor vehicle, if the breaking or entry is

- 1 effectuated for the purpose of removing an animal from the motor
- 2 vehicle and if all of the following apply:
- 3 (a) The person determines that the motor vehicle is locked and
- 4 there is no reasonable method for the animal to exit or be removed
- 5 from the motor vehicle.
- 6 (b) The person has a good-faith belief that forcible entry
- 7 into the motor vehicle is necessary because the animal is in
- 8 imminent danger of suffering harm if not immediately removed from
- 9 the motor vehicle and, based on the circumstances known to the
- 10 person at the time, the belief is reasonable.
- 11 (c) The person contacts either the local law enforcement
- 12 agency, the local fire department, or a 9-1-1 operator as soon as
- 13 possible before or after forcibly entering the motor vehicle.
- 14 (d) The person places a notice on the motor vehicle's
- 15 windshield with the person's contact information, the reason the
- 16 entry was made, the location of the animal, and a statement that
- 17 the local authorities have been notified.
- 18 (e) The person remains with the animal in a safe location, out
- 19 of the elements, but reasonably close to the motor vehicle, until
- 20 law enforcement, the fire department, or another emergency
- 21 responder arrives.
- 22 (f) The person does not use any more force to enter the motor
- 23 vehicle and remove the animal from the motor vehicle than is
- 24 necessary under the circumstances.
- 25 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect 90 days
- 26 after the date it is enacted into law.
