HOUSE BILL NO. 4670

May 24, 2019, Introduced by Reps. Wittenberg, Camilleri, Manoogian, Pagan, Stone, Sowerby, Kennedy, Koleszar, Love, Brixie, Brenda Carter, Hope, Gay-Dagnogo, Hoadley and Sabo and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to amend 1979 PA 94, entitled "The state school aid act of 1979,"

by amending sections 11 and 32p (MCL 388.1611 and 388.1632p), section 11 as amended by 2018 PA 586 and section 32p as amended by 2018 PA 265.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 11. (1) For the fiscal year ending September 30, 2018,
- 2 there is appropriated for the public schools of this state and
- 3 certain other state purposes relating to education the sum of
- 4 \$12,682,127,200.00 from the state school aid fund, the sum of





- 1 \$78,500,000.00 from the general fund, an amount not to exceed
- 2 \$72,000,000.00 from the community district education trust fund
- 3 created under section 12 of the Michigan trust fund act, 2000 PA
- 4 489, MCL 12.262, an amount not to exceed \$23,100,000.00 from the
- 5 MPSERS retirement obligation reform reserve fund, and an amount not
- 6 to exceed \$100.00 from the water emergency reserve fund. For the
- 7 fiscal year ending September 30, 2019, there is appropriated for
- 8 the public schools of this state and certain other state purposes
- 9 relating to education the sum of \$12,876,825,200.00
- 10 \$12,879,825,200.00 from the state school aid fund, the sum of
- 11 \$87,920,000.00 from the general fund, an amount not to exceed
- 12 \$72,000,000.00 from the community district education trust fund
- 13 created under section 12 of the Michigan trust fund act, 2000 PA
- 14 489, MCL 12.262, an amount not to exceed \$31,900,000.00 from the
- 15 MPSERS retirement obligation reform reserve fund, an amount not to
- 16 exceed \$30,000,000.00 from the school mental health and support
- 17 services fund created under section 31m, and an amount not to
- 18 exceed \$100.00 from the water emergency reserve fund. In addition,
- 19 all available federal funds are appropriated each fiscal year for
- 20 the fiscal years ending September 30, 2018 and September 30, 2019.
- 21 (2) The appropriations under this section shall be allocated
- 22 as provided in this article. Money appropriated under this section
- 23 from the general fund shall be expended to fund the purposes of
- 24 this article before the expenditure of money appropriated under
- 25 this section from the state school aid fund.
- 26 (3) Any general fund allocations under this article that are
- 27 not expended by the end of the state fiscal year are transferred to
- 28 the school aid stabilization fund created under section 11a.
- 29 Sec. 32p. (1) From the appropriation in section 11, there is



- 1 allocated an amount not to exceed \$13,400,000.00 \$16,400,000.00 to
- 2 intermediate districts for 2018-2019 for the purpose of providing
- 3 early childhood funding to intermediate school districts to support
- 4 the activities under subsection (2) and subsection (4), and to
- 5 provide early childhood programs for children from birth through
- 6 age 8. The funding provided to each intermediate district under
- 7 this section shall be determined by the distribution formula
- 8 established by the department's office of great start to provide
- 9 equitable funding statewide. In order to receive funding under this
- 10 section, each intermediate district shall provide an application to
- 11 the office of great start not later than September 15 of the
- 12 immediately preceding fiscal year indicating the activities planned
- 13 to be provided.
- 14 (2) Each intermediate district or consortium of intermediate
- 15 districts that receives funding under this section shall convene a
- 16 local great start collaborative and a parent coalition. The goal of
- 17 each great start collaborative and parent coalition shall be to
- 18 ensure the coordination and expansion of local early childhood
- 19 infrastructure and programs that allow every child in the community
- 20 to achieve the following outcomes:
- 21 (a) Children born healthy.
- (b) Children healthy, thriving, and developmentally on track
- 23 from birth to third grade.
- 24 (c) Children developmentally ready to succeed in school at the
- 25 time of school entry.
- 26 (d) Children prepared to succeed in fourth grade and beyond by
- 27 reading proficiently by the end of third grade.
- 28 (3) Each local great start collaborative and parent coalition
- 29 shall convene workgroups to make recommendations about community

- 1 services designed to achieve the outcomes described in subsection
- 2 (2) and to ensure that its local great start system includes the
- 3 following supports for children from birth through age 8:
- 4 (a) Physical health.
- 5 (b) Social-emotional health.
- 6 (c) Family supports and basic needs.
- 7 (d) Parent education.
- 8 (e) Early education, including the child's development of9 skills linked to success in foundational literacy, and care.
- 10 (4) From the funds allocated in subsection (1), at least 11 \$2,500,000.00 \$5,500,000.00 shall be used for the purpose of providing home visits to at-risk children and their families. The 12 home visits shall be conducted as part of a locally coordinated, 13 14 family-centered, evidence-based, data-driven home visit strategic 15 plan that is approved by the department. The goals of the home 16 visits funded under this subsection shall be to improve school readiness using evidence-based methods, including a focus on 17 18 developmentally appropriate outcomes for early literacy, to reduce 19 the number of pupils retained in grade level, to reduce the number 20 of pupils requiring special education services, to improve positive 21 parenting practices, and to improve family economic selfsufficiency while reducing the impact of high-risk factors through 22 23 community resources and referrals. The department shall coordinate 24 the goals of the home visit strategic plans approved under this 25 subsection with other state agency home visit programs in a way that strengthens Michigan's home visiting infrastructure and 26 maximizes federal funds available for the purposes of at-risk 27 28 family home visits. The coordination among departments and agencies 29 is intended to avoid duplication of state services and spending,



and should emphasize efficient service delivery of home visiting
programs.

- (5) Not later than December 1 of each year, each intermediate district shall provide a report to the department detailing the activities actually provided during the immediately preceding school year and the families and children actually served. At a minimum, the report shall include an evaluation of the services provided with additional funding under subsection (4) for home visits, using the goals identified in subsection (4) as the basis for the evaluation, including the degree to which school readiness was improved, any change in the number of pupils retained at grade level, and any change in the number of pupils receiving special education services. The department shall compile and summarize these reports and submit its summary to the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on school aid and to the house and senate fiscal agencies not later than February 15 of each year.
 - (6) An intermediate district or consortium of intermediate districts that receives funding under this section may carry over any unexpended funds received under this section into the next fiscal year and may expend those unused funds through June 30 of the next fiscal year. A recipient of a grant shall return any unexpended grant funds to the department in the manner prescribed by the department not later than September 30 of the next fiscal year after the fiscal year in which the funds are received.
