THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

Sec. 5506a. (1) An application for a new or renewal permit under this part and a permit for which an application was filed on or after the effective date of the amendatory act that added this section shall include a plan for the appropriate reduction of
