SENATE BILL NO. 1043

July 23, 2020, Introduced by Senators MCCANN, BAYER, POLEHANKI, WOJNO, BRINKS, ALEXANDER, MCMORROW, GEISS, CHANG, BULLOCK, IRWIN, HERTEL, MOSS, MCBROOM, ANANICH and SANTANA and referred to the Committee on Education and Career Readiness.

A bill to amend 1979 PA 94, entitled "The state school aid act of 1979,"

by amending section 104 (MCL 388.1704), as amended by 2019 PA 58.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 104. (1) In order to receive state aid under this
- 2 article, a district shall must comply with sections 1249, 1278a,
- 3 1278b, 1279, 1279g, and 1280b of the revised school code, MCL
- **4** 380.1249, 380.1278a, 380.1278b, 380.1279, 380.1279g, and 380.1280b,
- 5 and 1970 PA 38, MCL 388.1081 to 388.1086. Subject to subsection
- 6 (2), from the state school aid fund money appropriated in section

- 1 11, there is allocated for $\frac{2019-2020}{2020-2021}$ an amount not to
- 2 exceed \$32,009,400.00 \$29,509,400.00 for payments on behalf of
- 3 districts for costs associated with complying with those provisions
- 4 of law. In addition, from the federal funds appropriated in section
- 5 11, there is allocated for $\frac{2019-2020}{2020-2021}$ an amount estimated
- 6 at \$6,250,000.00 —funded from DED-OESE, title VI, state assessment
- 7 funds, and from DED-OSERS, section 504 of part B of the individuals
- 8 with disabilities education act, Public Law 94-142, plus any
- 9 carryover federal funds from previous year appropriations, for the
- 10 purposes of complying with the every student succeeds act, Public
- **11** Law 114-95.
- 12 (2) The results of each test administered as part of the
- 13 Michigan student test of educational progress (M-STEP), including
- 14 tests administered to high school students, must include an item
- 15 analysis that lists all items that are counted for individual pupil
- 16 scores and the percentage of pupils choosing each possible
- 17 response. The department shall work with the center to identify the
- 18 number of students enrolled at the time assessments are given by
- 19 each district. In calculating the percentage of pupils assessed for
- 20 a district's scorecard, the department shall use only the number of
- 21 pupils enrolled in the district at the time the district
- 22 administers the assessments and shall exclude pupils who enroll in
- 23 the district after the district administers the assessments.
- 24 (3) The department shall distribute federal funds allocated
- 25 under this section in accordance with federal law and with
- 26 flexibility provisions outlined in Public Law 107-116, and in the
- 27 education flexibility partnership act of 1999, Public Law 106-25.
- 28 (4) From the funds allocated in subsection (1), there is
- 29 allocated an amount not to exceed $\frac{2,500,000.00}{90.00}$ \$0.00 to an

- 1 intermediate district described in this subsection for the
- 2 continuation of statewide implementation of the Michigan
- 3 kindergarten entry observation tool (MKEO), beginning in the fall
- 4 of 2019, utilizing the Maryland-Ohio observational tool, also
- 5 referred to as the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment, as piloted
- 6 under this subsection in 2017-2018 and implemented in 2018-2019 and
- 7 2019-2020. The funding in this subsection is allocated to an
- 8 intermediate district in prosperity region 9 with at least 3,000
- 9 kindergarten pupils enrolled in its constituent districts. All of
- 10 the following apply to the implementation of the kindergarten entry
- 11 observation tool under this subsection:
- 12 (a) The Subject to subdivision (b), the department, in
- 13 collaboration with all intermediate districts, shall ensure that
- 14 the Michigan kindergarten entry observation tool is administered in
- 15 each kindergarten classroom to either the full census of
- 16 kindergarten pupils enrolled in the classroom or to a
- 17 representative sample of not less than 35% of the total
- 18 kindergarten pupils enrolled in each classroom. If a district
- 19 elects to administer the Michigan kindergarten entry observation
- 20 tool to a random sample of pupils within each classroom, the
- 21 district's intermediate district shall select the pupils who will
- 22 receive the assessment based on the same random method. Beginning
- 23 in 2020, the Subject to subdivision (b), the observation tool must
- 24 be administered within 45 days after the start of the school year.
- 25 (b) The Michigan kindergarten entry observation tool must not 26 be administered in the 2020-2021 school year.
- 20 De administered in the 2020 2021 School year.
- (c) (b) The intermediate district that receives funding under
- 28 this subsection, in collaboration with all other intermediate
- 29 districts, shall implement a "train the trainer" professional

- 1 development model on the usage of the Michigan kindergarten entry
- 2 observation tool. This training model must provide training to
- 3 intermediate district staff so that they may provide similar
- 4 training for staff of their constituent districts. This training
- 5 model must also ensure that the tool produces reliable data and
- 6 that there are a sufficient number of trainers to train all
- 7 kindergarten teachers statewide.
- 8 (d) (c) By March 1, 2021, and each year thereafter, the
- 9 department and the intermediate district that receives funding
- 10 under this subsection shall report to the house and senate
- 11 appropriations subcommittees on school aid, the house and senate
- 12 fiscal agencies, and the state budget director on the results of
- 13 the statewide implementation, including, but not limited to, an
- 14 evaluation of the demonstrated readiness of kindergarten pupils
- 15 statewide and the effectiveness of state and federal early
- 16 childhood programs that are designed for school readiness under
- 17 this state's authority, including the great start readiness program
- 18 and the great start readiness/Head Start blended program, as
- 19 referenced under section 32d. By September 1, 2021, and each year
- 20 thereafter, the department and the center shall provide a method
- 21 for districts and public school academies with kindergarten
- 22 enrollment to look up and verify their student enrollment data for
- 23 pupils who were enrolled in a publicly funded early childhood
- 24 program in the year before kindergarten, including the individual
- 25 great start readiness program, individual great start
- 26 readiness/Head Start blended program, individual title I preschool
- 27 program, individual section 31a preschool program, individual early
- 28 childhood special education program, or individual developmental
- 29 kindergarten or program for young 5-year-olds in which each tested

- 1 child was enrolled. A participating district shall analyze the data
- 2 to determine whether high-performing children were enrolled in any
- 3 specific early childhood program and, if so, report that finding to
- 4 the department and to the intermediate district that receives
- 5 funding under this subsection.
- 6 (e) (d) The department shall approve the language and literacy
- 7 domain within the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment for use by
- 8 districts as an initial assessment that may be delivered to all
- 9 kindergarten pupils to assist with identifying any possible area of
- 10 concern for a pupil in English language arts.
- (f) (e)—As used in this subsection:
- 12 (i) "Kindergarten" includes a classroom for young 5-year-olds,
- 13 commonly referred to as "young 5s" or "developmental kindergarten".
- 14 (ii) "Representative sample" means a sample capable of
- 15 producing valid and reliable assessment information on all or major
- 16 subgroups of kindergarten pupils in a district.
- 17 (5) The department may recommend, but may not require,
- 18 districts to allow pupils to use an external keyboard with tablet
- 19 devices for online M-STEP testing, including, but not limited to,
- 20 open-ended test items such as constructed response or equation
- 21 builder items.
- 22 (6) Notwithstanding section 17b, the department shall make
- 23 payments on behalf of districts, intermediate districts, and other
- 24 eligible entities under this section on a schedule determined by
- 25 the department.
- 26 (7) From the allocation in subsection (1), there is allocated
- 27 an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00 for $\frac{2019-2020}{2000}$ 2020-2021 for the
- 28 operation of an online reporting tool to provide student-level
- 29 assessment data in a secure environment to educators, parents, and

- 1 pupils immediately after assessments are scored. The department and
- 2 the center shall ensure that any data collected by the online
- 3 reporting tool do not provide individually identifiable student
- 4 data to the federal government.
- 5 (8) As used in this section:
- 6 (a) "DED" means the United States Department of Education.
- 7 (b) "DED-OESE" means the DED Office of Elementary and
- 8 Secondary Education.
- 9 (c) "DED-OSERS" means the DED Office of Special Education and
- 10 Rehabilitative Services.
