- 1 A resolution to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the
- 2 adoption of the Nineteenth Amendment by the Congress of the United

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- Whereas, One hundred years ago, the ratification of the 19th 1 Amendment to the United States Constitution granted all American 2 women the right to vote. This amendment forever changed and shaped 3 the landscape of American politics for future generations for all 4 5 Americans. Furthermore, the ratification of the 19th Amendment on 6 August 18, 1920, cemented and propelled voting equality for women 7 and was one of the most essential and landmark legislative decisions of historical, significant and powerful impact of the 8 9 20th century; and 10 Whereas, The United States Supreme Court decisions in the 11 cases of Fairchild v. Hughes, 258 U.S. 126 (1922) and Leser v. Garnett, 258 U.S. 130 (1922) held that the Nineteenth Amendment to 12 the United States Constitution had been constitutionally 13 14 established; and 15 Whereas, The National Women's Party staged marches, demonstrations, and hunger strikes pointing out the contradictions 16 of fighting for democracy while limiting it at home by denying the 17 18 women the right to vote; and Whereas, The efforts of women's political advocacy groups
- Whereas, The efforts of women's political advocacy groups
 swayed the public opinion, promoting President Wilson to announce
 his support to allow women the right to vote, a decades-long
 campaign for women's suffrage in the United States had finally seen
 its greatest breakthrough; now, therefore, be it
- Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of this legislative body commemorate the 100th anniversary of the adoption of the Nineteenth Amendment by the Congress of the United States.
