20 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized
21 under this part and part 1 and the departments, commissions,
22 boards, offices, and programs for which appropriations are made
23 under this part and part 1 are subject to the management and budget
24 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

25 Sec. 203. If the state administrative board, acting under
26 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount
27 appropriated under this act, the legislature may, by a concurrent
28 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and
29 serving in each house, inter-transfer funds within this act for the

particular department, board, commission, office, or institution.

Sec. 204. Funds appropriated in part 1 are subject to applicable federal audit and reporting requirements. Prompt action shall be taken if instances of noncompliance are identified, including noncompliance identified in an audit finding. 12 cleanup pursuant to a cooperative agreement with the United States

21 (a) The purpose of the project is to provide contaminated site
22 cleanup.

23 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing contracts
24 with service providers.

25 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is \$10,000,000.00.

26 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

27 Sec. 352. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
28 contaminated site remediation, the department shall conduct
29 environmental remediation activities at contaminated sites in

1 accordance with part 201 of the natural resources and environmental
2 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142.

3 Sec. 353. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for high
4 water infrastructure grants, the department shall develop a
5 competitive grant program to support the planning efforts of local
6 communities to prepare for and strengthen their resiliency in
7 relation to severe weather events, as well as provide
8 infrastructure grants that directly address the impacts and
9 vulnerabilities presented by those adverse conditions.

10 (2) A total of \$2,500,000.00 shall be designated for planning
11 grants that focus on the development of the following:

12 (a) Local action plans.

13 (b) Resiliency plans for communities impacted by high water
14 levels and coastal erosion.

15 (c) Resiliency plans for communities with undersized
16 infrastructure such as culverts or sanitary storm sewers.

17 (d) Zoning/planning ordinances for communities to prevent
18 severe weather impacts and adopt mitigation tools.

19 (3) A total of \$37,500,000.00 shall be designated for
20 infrastructure grants that focus on, but are not limited to,

23 (4) Eligible participants of this grant program are regional
24 councils of government and local units of government. A local unit
25 of government may act as a primary project sponsor and fiduciary
26 for a grant that includes partnerships or consortiums with other
27 public or nonprofit organizations.

28 (5) No planning grant may exceed \$200,000.00, and no
29 infrastructure grant may exceed \$2,500,000.00. A 25% match is

1 required for all grants.

2 (6) The department shall develop the grant program, selection
3 criteria, timelines, and reporting and other requirements. Grant
4 program information will be published in an accessible location on
5 the department's internet site. The department may partner with
6 other state agencies as necessary to develop and operate the

8 Sec. 354. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for PFAS
9 program, \$15,000,000.00 is allocated for a grant program for
10 municipal airports and independent airport authorities for costs of
11 monitoring and additional testing related to PFAS testing results.
12 From the remaining funds, the department shall award grants for up
13 to \$5,000,000.00 to community water supply public water systems for
14 contaminant remediation efforts or connection to an alternate
15 system as well as to invest in technologies to address contaminants

2 accordance with section 273a of the mental health code, 1974 PA
3 258, MCL 330.1273a.

4 Sec. 402. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for community
5 substance use disorder prevention, education, and treatment, the
6 department shall allocate \$600,000.00 as grants for recovery
7 community organizations to offer or expand recovery support center
8 services or recovery community center services to individuals
9 seeking long-term recovery from substance use disorders in
10 accordance with section 273b of the mental health code, 1974 PA
11 258, MCL 330.1273b.

12 Sec. 403. The funds appropriated in part 1 for program of all-
13 inclusive care for the elderly must be used to increase the
14 enrollment cap by a statewide amount of not less than 100 slots of
15 which, 60 slots must be allocated to an existing program of all-
16 inclusive care for the elderly center located in a county with a
17 population greater than 1,800,000 and in a city with a population
18 of between 98,000 and 99,000 according to the 2010 federal
19 decennial census.

20 Sec. 404. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for homeless
21 programs, the department of health and human services shall
22 allocate \$300,000.00 to increase funding for current contracted
23 providers of the emergency shelter program.

24 Sec. 405. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for hospital
25 airborne pathogen control program, \$5,000,000.00 shall be allocated
26 to hospitals for in-room ceiling-installed and internet of things
27 IoT-connected ultraviolet control technology filtration and
28 cleaning systems or other devices that reduce surface pathogens and
29 airborne contaminants for control of harmful pathogens in the air

1 and on settled surfaces. The control program shall include all of
2 the following parameters:

3 (a) The program shall be a pilot program.

4 (b) The first priority of allocation of funds shall be to
5 hospitals. Other health facilities and education facilities shall
6 also be eligible for funds as a second level of priority.

22 prosecutors. As a contractual agreement for the funds provided in
23 this section, the prosecuting attorneys coordinating council must
24 create and operate a grant program that provides grants to county
25 prosecutor's offices. Grant funding to county prosecutor's offices
26 must be used for appropriate and reasonable investigations of the

3 findings of the investigation and a detailed listing of all
4 expenditures made.

5 (6) By September 1, and annually thereafter, as a contractual
6 agreement for the funds provided in this section, the prosecuting
7 attorneys coordinating council shall submit a report to the senate
8 and house committees on appropriations on the grant program. The
9 report shall include a listing of all counties that applied for
10 funding, all counties that received funding, the amount of funding
11 received by county, and the total amount expended for the program.

12 (7) Unexpended and encumbered funds up to a maximum of
13 \$5,000,000.00 appropriated in part 1 for long-term care facility
14 supports are designated as a work project appropriation. Any
15 unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the
16 fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for projects
17 under this section until the projects have been completed. The
18 following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management
19 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

20 (a) The purpose of the work project is to appropriately and
21 reasonably investigate state COVID-19 nursing home processes and
22 policies established by the state in response to COVID-19.

23 (b) The work project will be accomplished by contracting with
24 the prosecuting attorneys coordinating council to oversee grants to
25 county prosecutor's offices.

26 (c) The estimated cost of this project is \$5,000,000.00.

27 (d) The tentative completion date for the work project is
28 September 30, 2023.

29 Sec. 408. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for long-term

1 care facility supports, the department of health and human services
2 shall allocate \$2,000,000.00 in grant funding to a foundation that
3 develops the leadership of youth and young adults by engaging them
4 in community service, including assisting with COVID-19 vaccine
5 appointments, located in a county with a population greater than
6 1,700,000 and in a city with a population between 57,000 and 58,000
7 according to the 2010 federal decennial census.

8 Sec. 409. The funds appropriated in part 1 for lost autistic
9 and disabled individuals safety protocols shall be used by the
10 department of health and human services to facilitate improved
11 safety protocols for autistic and disabled individuals at risk of
12 wandering or becoming lost. The department shall provide grants for
13 the following purposes:

14 (a) \$250,000.00 to an entity that has a grant or contract
15 agreement to provide autism navigator services under section 1920
16 of article 6 of 2020 PA 166 for the distribution of GPS tracking
17 devices to autistic and disabled individuals at risk of wandering
18 or becoming lost.

19 (b) \$150,000.00 as matching funds to local law enforcement
20 entities for the purchase of infrared-capable drones to assist in
21 search and rescue operations.

22 (c) \$50,000.00 to an entity that has a grant or contract
23 agreement to provide autism navigator services under section 1920
24 of article 6 of 2020 PA 166 for marketing and outreach of lost
25 autistic and disabled individuals safety protocols.

26 (d) \$50,000.00 to an entity that has a grant or contract
27 agreement to provide autism navigator services under section 1920
28 of article 6 of 2020 PA 166 to create safety protocols for local
29 units of government, including law enforcement entities. As used in

1 this subdivision "safety protocols" includes, but is not limited
2 to, vulnerable or impaired person (VIP) enrollment according to
3 section 4 of the child identification and protection act, 1985 PA
4 176, MCL 722.774, and fingerprinting under section 4 of 1935 PA
5 120, MCL 28.274.

6 Sec. 410. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for mental
7 health facilities, the department of health and human services
8 shall allocate \$85,000,000.00 for planning and construction of a
9 new Hawthorn Center for children and adolescents.

10 (2) Unexpended and unencumbered funds up to a maximum
11 \$85,000,000.00 in part 1 for mental health facilities are
12 designated as a work project appropriation. Any unencumbered or
13 unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and
14 shall be available for expenditures for planning and construction
15 of a new Hawthorn Center for children and adolescents under this
16 section until the work project has been completed. All of the
17 following are in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management
18 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

19 (a) The purpose of the work project is to plan and construct a
20 new Hawthorn Center for children and adolescents.

21 (b) The work project will be accomplished by utilizing state
22 employees, contracts, or both.

23 (c) The total estimated completion cost of the work project is
24 \$85,000,000.00.

25 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

26 Sec. 411. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for mental
27 health facilities, the department of health and human services
28 shall allocate \$100,000,000.00 for a competitive grant program for
29 health care providers to increase the number of long-term pediatric

1 psychiatric inpatient hospitals or centers by a total of 120 beds
2 statewide. Grant applicants must identify 20% matching funds as
3 part of the grant application.

4 (2) As part of the competitive grant award process, the
5 department of health and human services must ensure an equitable
6 distribution of grants awards across the state and must meet all of
7 the following:

8 (a) Not less than 10% of the grant funding is awarded within
9 prosperity region 1.

10 (b) Not less than a combined 10% of the grant funding is

10 shall allocate \$3,000,000.00 to a nonprofit health care system
11 organized under the laws of this state that is exempt from federal
12 income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the internal revenue code of
13 1986, 26 USC 501, that is located in a county with a population
14 between 25,000 and 27,000 and in a city with a population between
15 4,500 and 5,000 according to the most recent federal decennial
16 census for the purpose of supporting an emergency department unit
17 and additional psychiatric beds that's services include, but are
18 not limited to, patient emergency behavioral health needs.

19 Sec. 413. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for mental
20 health facilities, the department of health and human services
21 shall allocate \$2,000,000.00 to a nonprofit health care system
22 organized under the laws of this state that is exempt from federal
23 income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the internal revenue code of
24 1986, 26 USC 501, for a pilot program located in a county with a
25 population between 280,000 and 281,000 according to the most recent
26 federal decennial census for the purpose of operating a pilot
27 program to ensure that the behavioral and physical health needs of
28 Michigan residents are addressed. This pilot program shall seek to
29 provide additional behavioral health services in a more efficient

1 manner due to a partnership with state-based institutions on
2 staffing assistance and shared services with a Michigan-based
3 health system.

4 Sec. 414. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for mental
5 health facilities, the department of health and human services
6 shall allocate \$15,000,000.00 to create a competitive grant program
7 for health care providers to invest in infrastructure necessary to
8 provide better medical care for individuals seeking behavioral
9 health care services through an emergency department. Grant
10 applicants must identify 20% matching funds as part of the grant
11 application.

12 (2) As part of the competitive grant award process, the
13 department of health and human services must award grants to not
14 less than 5 health care providers that meet the requirements of the
15 grant program.

16 (3) Unexpended and unencumbered funds up to a maximum of
17 \$15,000,000.00 in part 1 for mental health facilities are
18 designated as a work project appropriation. Any unencumbered or
19 unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and
20 shall be available for expenditures for competitive grant funding
21 for health care providers to invest in infrastructure necessary to
22 provide better medical care for individuals seeking behavioral
23 health care services through an emergency department under this
24 section until the work project has been completed. All of the
25 following are in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management

28 a competitive grant funding program for health care providers to
29 invest in infrastructure necessary to provide better medical care

1 for individuals seeking behavioral health care services through an
2 emergency department.

3 (b) The work project will be accomplished by utilizing state
4 employees, contracts, or both.

5 (c) The total estimated completion cost of the work project is
6 \$15,000,000.00.

7 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

8 Sec. 415. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for mental
9 health facilities, the department of health and human services
10 shall allocate \$10,000,000.00 to create a 1-time grant program for
11 entities interested in establishing crisis stabilization units in
12 accordance with chapter 9A of the mental health code, 1974 PA 258,
13 MCL 330.1971 to 330.1979, or psychiatric residential treatment
14 facilities in accordance with section 137a of the mental health
15 code, 1974 PA 258, MCL 330.1137a. Grant applicants must disseminate
16 how the requested grant funding would be used for certification
17 standards and requirements or for obtaining accreditation
18 requirements.

19 (2) Unexpended and unencumbered funds up to a maximum of
20 \$10,000,000.00 in part 1 for mental health facilities are
21 designated as a work project appropriation. Any unencumbered or
22 unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and
23 shall be available for expenditures for a one-time grant program
24 for entities interested in establishing crisis stabilization units
25 or psychiatric residential treatment facilities under this section
26 until the work project has been completed. The following are in
27 compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act,
28 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

29 (a) The purpose of the work project is to create and implement

1 a 1-time grant program for entities interested in establishing
2 crisis stabilization units or psychiatric residential treatment
3 facilities.

4 (b) The work project will be accomplished by utilizing state
5 employees, contracts, or both.

6 (c) The total estimated completion cost of the work project is
7 \$10,000,000.00.

8 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

9 Sec. 416. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for private
10 accredited child welfare agency coronavirus relief grants, the
11 department of health and human services shall allocate
12 \$3,000,000.00 to child welfare agencies that are members of the
13 Association of Accredited Child and Family Agencies for eligible
14 expenses related to COVID-19 including, but not limited to,
15 personal protection equipment, facility modification, and
16 technology upgrades.

17 Sec. 417. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for the first
18 responder and public safety staff mental health, the department of
19 health and human services shall allocate \$7,500,000.00 towards a
20 grant program to behavioral health providers to support
21 firefighters, police officers, emergency medical services
22 personnel, dispatchers, and local correctional officers, and
23 especially those working on special teams such as internet sex
24 crimes, sexual crimes against children, or traffic fatalities who
25 are dealing with post-traumatic stress syndrome and other mental
26 health conditions to have access to enhanced mental health
27 services.

28 Sec. 418. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for hospital
29 COVID-19 grants, the department of health and human services shall

1 provide grants to hospitals in this state to help cover increased
2 hospital costs and reduced hospital revenue related to the COVID-19
3 pandemic. The grant to each hospital shall equal each hospital's
4 percentage of total state Medicaid inpatient claims revenue,
5 including Medicaid managed care inpatient claims revenue, in the
6 most recent 12 months for which the information is available
7 multiplied by the appropriation for hospital COVID-19 grants in
8 part 1.

9 Sec. 419. By June 1, the department of health and human
10 services shall provide a report to the senate and house
11 appropriations committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies,
12 and the senate and house policy offices on total department of
13 health and human services operation costs by line item and where
14 the department of health and human services would reduce
15 \$160,000,000.00 from its operation costs by line item for the
16 fiscal year ending September 30, 2022 for the purpose of recovering
17 expenses incurred for miscalculating hospital inpatient rates and
18 relative weights.

19 Sec. 420. From the funds appropriated in part 1a for mental
20 health facilities, the department of health and human services
21 shall appropriate \$5,000,000.00 as a grant to a nonprofit Michigan
22 health system organized under the laws of this state that is exempt
23 from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the internal
24 revenue code of 1986, 26 USC 501 that operates not less than 3
25 licensed adult psychiatric inpatient programs located in counties
26 with a population not less than 1,000,000 and with a planned new
27 hospital dedicated to mental health located in a county with a
28 population greater than 1,800,000 and in a city with a population
29 of between 98,000 and 99,000 according to the 2010 federal

decennial census for the purpose of supporting a new psychiatric residency training program. The grant must be distributed in full 30 days after the effective date of this act.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

Sec. 451. The funds appropriated in part 1 for agricultural processing support grants shall be used for grants to aid the recovery of Michigan's agricultural supply chain businesses, including, but not limited to, processing plants, abattoirs, and storage facilities. Grants may be used by the grantee to purchase personal protective equipment, provide training, and any other goods or services that facilitate the recovery of agricultural supply chain businesses.

Sec. 452. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the community health campuses pilot project shall be awarded for a pilot project that develops an integrated wellness facility that includes mental, physical, and behavioral health components, including, but not limited to, the following services:

- (a) Rehabilitation.
- (b) Optical.
- (c) Dental.
- (d) Primary care.
- (e) Urgent care.
- (f) Chiropractic.
- (g) Community mental health.
- (h) Child care.

(2) The pilot project must be designed to serve underserved areas where access to one stop wellness is deficient or absent. In addition to the health components, the integrated wellness facility

1 must include, at a minimum, indoor aquatics, gymnasium, and workout
2 facilities in the same facility. The workout facilities must
3 provide no or low-cost access to individuals earning less than 200%
4 of the federal poverty level. Individuals at or above 200% of the
5 federal poverty level may be charged a fee.

6 Sec. 453. The funds appropriated in part 1 for unemployment
7 insurance benefit claims monitoring must be used to support ongoing
8 costs related to unemployment insurance benefit claims monitoring
9 and fraud detection through the use of a third-party service that
10 provides a proprietary identity document capture and verification
11 solution.

12 Sec. 454. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the
13 unemployment insurance stabilization fund shall be deposited into
14 the fund created in subsection (2) and expended pursuant to
15 subsection (3).

16 (2) The unemployment insurance stabilization fund is created
17 within the department of treasury. The state treasurer may receive
18 money or other assets from any source for deposit into the fund.
19 The state treasurer shall direct the investment of the fund. The
20 state treasurer shall credit to the fund interest and earnings from
21 the fund investments.

22 (3) All funds in the unemployment insurance stabilization fund
23 are appropriated and available for expenditure only to provide a
24 stabilization payment to the unemployment trust fund administered
25 by the unemployment insurance agency subject to the following
26 conditions:

27 (a) If the balance of the unemployment trust fund falls below
28 \$235,000,000.00, the balance of the unemployment insurance
29 stabilization fund shall be deposited in the unemployment trust

1 fund.

2 (b) If the balance of the unemployment trust fund remains
3 above \$235,000,000.00 through September 30, 2021, any funds
4 remaining in the unemployment insurance stabilization fund shall
5 lapse to the fund from which they were originally received.
6 Interest and earnings from fund investments shall lapse to the
7 general fund.

8
9 **LEGISLATURE**

10 Sec. 501. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
11 independent studies, \$750,000.00 is appropriated to the legislative
12 council to establish and utilize a legislative independent study
13 work group that will contract with a third-party vendor for a study
14 that compares pupil learning loss across virtual, hybrid, and in-
15 person instruction in the state of Michigan and reports on whether
16 there are any statistically significant differences in student
17 growth between virtual, hybrid, and in-person instruction. The
18 study must emphasize students who were in traditional, in-person
19 classrooms in the 2018-2019 school year and compare student growth
20 between the 2019-2020 school year and the 2020-2021 school year by
21 virtual, hybrid, and in-person instruction method.

22 (2) The study must include a measurement of student growth
23 between the 2019-2020 school year and the 2020-2021 school year by
24 predominate learning method by grade level for each school district
25 and intermediate school district categorizing grade levels as
26 follows:

27 (a) Grades mostly virtual, which means districts that had 100%
28 virtual-only instruction option for all students within a grade
29 level for 50% or more of the school year.

1 (b) Grades partially virtual, which means districts that had
2 100% virtual-only instruction option for all students within a
3 grade level for more than 25% of the school year but less than 50%
4 of the school year.

5 (c) Grades hybrid, which means districts that offered a hybrid
6 of in-person and virtual instruction to students within a grade
7 level that do not fit subdivision (a), (b), (d), or (e).

8 (d) Grades partially in-person, which means districts not
9 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
10 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students within a grade level
11 for more than 25% of the school year but not more than 50% of the
12 school year.

13 (e) Grades mostly in-person, which means districts not
14 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
15 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students within a grade level
16 for more than 50% of the school year.

17 (3) The study must include a measurement of student growth
18 between the 2019-2020 school year and the 2020-2021 school year by
19 predominate learning method, determined by a weighted average of
20 all learning methods utilized throughout the district categorizing
21 districts as follows:

22 (a) District mostly virtual, which means districts that had
23 100% virtual-only instruction option for all students for 50% or
24 more of the school year.

25 (b) Districts partially virtual, which means districts that
26 had 100% virtual-only instruction option for all students for more
27 than 25% of the school year but less than 50% of the school year.

28 (c) Districts hybrid, which means districts that offered a
29 hybrid of in-person and virtual instruction that do not fit

1 subdivision (a), (b), (d), or (e).

2 (d) Districts partially in-person, which means districts not
3 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
4 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students for more than 25% of
5 the school year but not more than 50% of the school year.

6 (e) Districts mostly in-person, which means districts not
7 described in subdivision (a) or (b) that offered in-person
8 instruction for a minimum of 80% of students for more than 50% of
9 the school year.

10 (4) The legislative council shall establish a legislative
11 independent study work group with the authority to issue a request
12 for proposal and select a vendor to conduct the study described in
13 this section. The legislative independent study work group shall
14 consist of 1 republican member of the Michigan senate, 1 democratic
15 member of the Michigan senate, 1 republican member of the Michigan
16 house of representatives, and 1 democratic member of the Michigan
17 house of representatives. The legislative independent study work
18 group shall issue a request for proposal for a vendor to conduct
19 the study identified in this section not later than 30 days after
20 the enactment of this bill and select a vendor to conduct the study
21 identified in this section not later than 60 days after enactment
22 of this bill.

23 (5) The study shall be transmitted to the senate and house of
24 representatives appropriations committees, the senate and house
25 fiscal agencies, and the state budget office not later than
26 September 30, 2021.

27 (6) As used in this section, "district" includes a public
28 school academy.

29 Sec. 502. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for

1 independent studies, \$750,000.00 is appropriated to the legislative
2 council to establish and utilize a legislative independent study
3 work group that will contract with a third-party vendor for a study
4 that examines the effect of COVID-19 stay-at-home orders,
5 shutdowns, and other mandates on COVID-19 outcomes in Michigan,
6 including the number of COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and
7 deaths. The study must include, but is not limited to, the
8 following:

9 (a) The effect of state's COVID-19 stay-at-home orders,
10 shutdowns, and other mandates on the magnitude and timing of cases
11 and case rates in Michigan compared to other states. This must
12 include a comprehensive analysis of both the short-term and long-
13 term effects of state COVID-19 stay-at-home orders, shutdowns, and
14 other mandates on cases and case rates and an analysis of whether
15 the state COVID-19 stay-at-home orders, shutdowns, and other
16 mandates were effective at reducing the overall number of cases and
17 case rates or whether they altered the timing of when cases
18 occurred and were not effective at reducing overall cases and case
19 rates.

20 (b) A detailed comparison of COVID-19 outcomes and metrics in
21 Michigan to COVID-19 outcomes and metrics in Illinois, Indiana,
22 Ohio, and Wisconsin that incorporates state policy actions,
23 including COVID-19 stay-at-home orders, shutdowns, and other
24 mandates.

25 (c) A comparative analysis of the economic impact Michigan's
26 COVID-19 state-at-home orders, shutdowns, and other mandates
27 against Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and Wisconsin. This analysis must
28 also include findings identifying any measurable differences in
29 COVID-19 positivity rates per capita, serious illness per capita,

1 and mortality per capita.

2 (d) Information on the effectiveness of mask mandates on
3 COVID-19 metrics in youth athletics that must provide, at a
4 minimum, a comparison of Michigan's COVID-19 metrics in youth to
5 COVID-19 metrics in states without mask mandates for youth
6 athletics. Youth COVID-19 metrics to be compared must include, but
7 not be limited to, positivity rate per capita, serious illness per
8 capita, and mortality rate per capita.

9 (2) The legislative council shall establish a legislative
10 independent study work group with the authority to issue a request
11 for proposal and select a vendor to conduct the study described in
12 this section. The legislative independent study work group shall
13 consist of 1 republican member of the Michigan senate, 1 democratic
14 member of the Michigan senate, 1 republican member of the Michigan
15 house of representatives, and 1 democratic member of the Michigan
16 house of representatives. The legislative independent study work
17 group shall issue a request for proposal for a vendor to conduct
18 the study identified in this section not later than 30 days after
19 the enactment of this bill and select a vendor to conduct the study
20 identified in this section not later than 60 days after enactment
21 of this bill.

22 (3) The study shall be transmitted to the senate and house of
23 representatives appropriations committees, the senate and house
24 fiscal agencies, and the state budget office not later than
25 September 30, 2021.

26
27 **DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND VETERANS AFFAIRS**

28 Sec. 541. Funds appropriated in part 1 for premium pay for
29 frontline employees must include premium payments to social

workers, activity staff, dietary service staff, and other facility staff of the Michigan veteran homes who have performed hazardous duty or work involving physical hardship related to COVID-19 among other staff identified by the Michigan veterans facility authority to receive premium payments. Premium payments must be distributed equally among all eligible employees.

DEPARTMENT OF TECHNOLOGY, MANAGEMENT, AND BUDGET

Sec. 551. Funds appropriated in part 1 for broadband expansion act of Michigan must be used to support the statewide broadband service grant program created under the broadband expansion act of Michigan, 2020 PA 224, MCL 484.3251 to 484.3261.

Sec. 552. Funds appropriated in part 1 for state employee rightsizing are appropriated for the purpose of providing an incentive for state workers to leave state employment due to the increased efficiency of the state workforce. This incentive may not be used for an early-out retirement program or severances not related to increased state employee efficiency. The value of any rightsizing incentive is capped at an amount equal to 6 weeks of pay.

Sec. 553. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for state facility divestments must be expended to support costs associated with divesting state-owned buildings and office space. Allowable costs for use of the funds include, but are not limited to, those associated with selling a building or property and demolition.

(2) The department of technology, management, and budget must submit a report not later than June 1 that provides a list of expenditures and a description of the property or building and the benefit of each expenditure. The report must also include

1 information on additional state facilities under consideration for
2 divestment. The report must be submitted to the senate and house
3 appropriations committees, the senate and house appropriations
4 subcommittees on general government, the senate and house fiscal
5 agencies, and the state budget office.

6 Sec. 554. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
7 venture Michigan fund II voucher purchase, the state budget
8 director is authorized to pay the portion prescribed in subdivision
9 (c) of the outstanding monetary obligations owed by venture
10 Michigan fund, a Michigan early stage venture investment
11 corporation created under the Michigan early stage venture
12 investment act of 2003, 2003 PA 296, MCL 125.2231 to 125.2263, to
13 Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under that certain loan
14 agreement, dated as of December 22, 2010, between venture Michigan
15 fund and Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC, as amended, in return
16 for surrender to the state treasurer all of the tax voucher
17 certificates issued by venture Michigan fund for the benefit of
18 Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under section 23 of the
19 Michigan early stage venture investment act of 2003, 2003 PA 296,
20 MCL 125.2253, with the following stipulations:

21 (a) Venture Michigan fund borrowed funds under the loan
22 agreement pursuant to section 17 of the Michigan early stage
23 venture investment act of 2003, 2003 PA 296, MCL 125.2247, and
24 Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC is the only lender.

25 (b) The prepayment of all outstanding monetary obligations
26 owed by venture Michigan fund to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware
27 LLC are made as provided in the loan agreement.

28 (c) Venture Michigan fund contributes not less than
29 \$120,000,000.00 of the prepayment of all outstanding monetary

1 obligations owed by venture Michigan fund to Stanton Equity Trading
2 Delaware LLC under the loan agreement, with the payment from the
3 state budget director authorized under this subsection limited to
4 the balance of all the outstanding monetary obligations owed by
5 venture Michigan fund to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under
6 the loan agreement.

7 (d) If the amount appropriated in part 1 for venture Michigan
8 fund II voucher purchase is insufficient to pay the portion to be
9 paid by the state budget director of all of the outstanding
10 monetary obligations of venture Michigan fund owed to Stanton
11 Equity Trading Delaware LLC, then there is appropriated not more
12 than \$1,500,000.00 from the state general fund for that purpose
13 only.

14 (e) The prepayment of all the outstanding monetary obligations
15 of venture Michigan fund owed to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware
16 LLC must be conditioned upon surrender to the state treasurer of
17 all tax voucher certificates issued by venture Michigan fund for
18 the benefit of Stanton Equity Trading Delaware LLC under section 23
19 of the Michigan early stage venture investment act of 2003, 2003 PA
20 296, MCL 125.2253.

21 (f) The prepayment of all the outstanding monetary obligations
22 of venture Michigan fund owed to Stanton Equity Trading Delaware
23 LLC and the surrender of the tax voucher certificates to the state
24 treasurer shall occur not later than September 30, 2021.

25 (g) Any unexpended balance of the amounts appropriated in part
26 1 and in subdivision (d) shall lapse to the state general fund.

27 (2) Upon surrender of the tax voucher certificates to the
28 state treasurer, the state treasurer shall destroy the tax voucher
29 certificates.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE

Sec. 575. Funds appropriated in part 1 for first responder bags shall be used by the department to purchase 1,200 Haynes first responder bags for police cruisers.

Sec. 576. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for body-worn camera programs, \$2,500,000.00 must be used by the department of state police to outfit its troopers with body-worn cameras and to support any costs associated with maintenance of body-worn cameras and storage and processing of data from body-worn cameras.

(2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for body-worn camera programs, \$7,500,000.00 must be distributed by the department of state police to local public safety departments, through a competitive grant process, to assist them with funding equipment and personnel necessary to implement and maintain body-worn camera programs.

Sec. 577. Funds appropriated in part 1 for community policing programs must be allocated by the department of state police to create a competitive grant program for local public safety departments to create or expand community policing programs. The grant application must be on a form created by the department of state police and must require that any program receiving support under this section create or expand law enforcement officer positions dedicated to maintaining a community presence and building neighborhood relationships. Funds appropriated in part 1 for community policing programs must be reserved for local public safety departments and only local public safety departments may apply for grant awards.

Sec. 578. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for law

1 enforcement signing bonuses, the department of state police must
2 allocate \$5,000,000.00 to be distributed through a grant program to
3 local public safety departments in this state to provide signing
4 bonuses to new law enforcement officers upon employment. A signing
5 bonus for an officer provided utilizing funding appropriated in
6 part 1 must not exceed \$2,000.00. For the purposes of this section,
7 no more than 25 signing bonuses may be offered by a particular
8 local public safety department.

9 Sec. 579. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for local
10 law enforcement explorer programs, the department of state police
11 must distribute funding to local public safety departments to
12 create or expand explorer programs and job shadowing programs.

13 (2) Activities that participants in explorer programs may
14 participate in include all of the following:

- 15 (a) Processing mock crime scenes.
- 16 (b) Conducting mock trials.
- 17 (c) Receiving presentations from canine officers.
- 18 (d) Receiving presentations from special response teams.
- 19 (e) Receiving presentations from the drug enforcement agency.
- 20 (f) Receiving presentations from medical examiners.
- 21 (g) Touring 9-1-1 operations.

22 (3) Applicants to explorer programs supported by the funding
23 made available under this section must meet all of the following
24 criteria:

25 (a) Be currently enrolled as a student in at least grade 9,
26 but not be older than 21 years of age.

27 (b) Possess a minimum grade point average of at least 2.0 on a
28 four-point scale.

29 (c) Maintain an appropriate school attendance and behavioral

1 record.

2 (d) Receive a letter of recommendation from school staff or a
3 law enforcement professional.

4 (4) Job shadow programs supported under this section are
5 intended for individuals between 18 and 25 years of age. A stipend
6 may be provided for job shadow participants and the program should
7 be as immersive as possible. Job shadow applicants must receive a
8 letter of recommendation from appropriate educational staff or a
9 law enforcement professional.

10 Sec. 580. (1) From the funding appropriated in part 1 for
11 police academy assistance, \$10,000,000.00 must be allocated for
12 training academy recruit salaries for recruits from local public
13 safety departments, to provide salaries of up to \$4,000.00 to
14 police cadets who are receiving tuition assistance under subsection
15 (2) of this section.

16 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for police academy
17 assistance, the department of state police must allocate
18 \$20,000,000.00 to create a competitive scholarship program for
19 local public safety department recruits, which will provide a
20 police academy scholarship of up to \$20,000.00 per recruit on a
21 first-come, first-serve basis to applicants who meet the necessary
22 requirements and enroll in a police academy program.

23 (3) The requirements that an applicant must meet in order to
24 receive a scholarship include the following:

25 (a) He or she has applied to at least one MCOLES-approved law
26 enforcement basic training academy.

27 (b) He or she has completed an interview and received approval
28 for the scholarship from the local public safety department that he
29 or she intends to serve.

1 (4) For the purposes of this section, no more than 25
2 scholarships may be approved by a particular local public safety
3 department.

4 Sec. 581. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
5 recruitment marketing, the department of state police must
6 establish a competitive grant program for the development of
7 targeted marketing and advertising campaigns for recruitment in the
8 local law enforcement profession.

9 Sec. 582. As used in this part, "local public safety
10 department" means a public safety department at the county, city,
11 village, or township level.

12 Sec. 583. Funding appropriated in part 1 for the department of
13 state police shall not be used by the department for administrative
14 costs.

15
16 **STATE TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT**

17 Sec. 601. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for local road and
18 bridge bundling initiative shall be expended by the department to
19 support a statewide program for the rehabilitation or replacement
20 of road and bridges owned by local road agencies. The department
21 shall coordinate the local road and bridge bundling initiative and
22 issue contracts necessary for planning, design, and construction
23 work related to roads and bridges selected for the program.

24 (2) The department shall provide a progress report on the
25 local road and bridge bundling initiative to the senate and house
26 appropriations subcommittees on transportation, the senate and
27 house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office by September 30.

28 Sec. 602. Funds appropriated in part 1 for state trunkline
29 fund bond advance repayment shall be used to retire bonds issued by

1 the Michigan state transportation department prior to January 1,
2 2021.

3 Sec. 603. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for transportation
4 bond repayment sinking fund shall be credited to the transportation
5 bond repayment sinking fund established in House Bill No. 4669 of
6 the 101st Legislature.

7 (2) Funds appropriated in part 1 for transportation bond
8 repayment sinking fund must not be spent or otherwise distributed
9 unless both of the following bills of the 101st Legislature are
10 enacted into law:

11 (a) House Bill No. 4082.

12 (b) House Bill No. 4669.

13
14 **DEPARTMENT OF TREASURY**

15 Sec. 651. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for
16 disaster relief, \$56,000.00 shall be awarded to a city with a
17 population between 3,000 and 4,000 located in a county with a
18 population between 63,000 and 64,000 according to the most recent
19 federal decennial census to cover the costs from disaster flooding
20 that occurred in 2019 that have not been reimbursed from other
21 sources.

22 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for disaster relief,
23 \$2,400.00 shall be awarded to a city with a population between
24 5,000 and 6,000 located in a county with a population between
25 63,000 and 64,000 according to the most recent federal decennial
26 census to cover the costs from disaster flooding that occurred in
27 2019 that have not been reimbursed from other sources.

28 Sec. 652. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for great
29 start readiness program teacher COVID-19 grants, there is allocated

1 for only 2020-2021 an amount not to exceed \$15,000,000.00 for grants
2 to eligible teachers to recognize the additional time spent outside
3 of normal working hours and additional costs eligible teachers have
4 incurred as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

5 (2) The department shall distribute funding allocated under
6 this section directly to eligible teachers in an equal amount up to
7 \$500.00 per FTE eligible teacher employed by an eligible provider.
8 An eligible teacher that works full time and is calculated as 1.0
9 FTE will receive \$500.00 and an eligible teacher whose work time is
10 calculated as less than 1.0 FTE shall receive that portion of the
11 FTE applied to \$500.00. The department must distribute funding
12 allocated under this subsection as soon as it is feasible.

13 (3) The eligible teacher must certify to the eligible
14 provider, in a manner prescribed by the department, that he or she
15 worked additional time outside of normal working hours, experienced
16 hazardous conditions, or incurred additional costs related to
17 ensuring students could effectively participate in their eligible
18 provider's great start readiness program.

19 (4) Eligible providers shall provide to the department of
20 treasury a list of eligible teachers including their residency
21 address on file.

22 (5) Eligible providers shall maintain documentation of
23 eligibility for eligible teachers under subsection (3).

24 (6) If funds allocated under this section are insufficient to
25 award the amount in subsection (2) to each of the eligible
26 teachers, the department shall reduce the grant on an equal per
27 full-time and part-time prorated equated classroom teacher basis.

28 (7) The department may retain up to 1/2 of 1% of total funding
29 under this section for administration of this section.

1 (8) Any correspondence from the state of Michigan associated
2 with the issuance of the grant shall contain only information
3 indicating that the eligible teacher was eligible for the grant
4 under this section. The correspondence must be sent from the state
5 treasurer.

6 (9) As used in this section:

7 (a) "Eligible teacher" means a full-time or part-time teacher
8 with an assigned class with an eligible provider that is funded
9 under section 32d of the state school aid act of 1979, MCL
10 388.1632d, who taught students during the 2019-2020 school year and
11 submitted an approved certification under subsection (3). For the
12 purposes of this section, eligible teacher does not include
13 substitute teachers, paraprofessionals, support staff, or
14 administrators.

15 (b) "Eligible provider" means a great start readiness program
16 that receives funding under section 32d of the state school aid act
17 of 1979, MCL 388.1632d.

18 Sec. 653. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for water and
19 sewer replacement grants are to be used for a competitive grant
20 program that provides grants to local units of government for
21 eligible water and sewer replacement projects. Eligible water and
22 sewer replacement projects are projects that have been identified
23 in asset management plans under the stormwater, asset management,
24 and wastewater grant program administered by the Michigan
25 department of environment, Great Lakes, and energy. Not more than
26 10% of the total available for grants may be allocated to a local
27 unit of government. The department must require a 25% match in
28 funds from each local unit of government to which funds are
29 awarded.

1 (2) The department of treasury shall develop an application
2 process and detailed guidance for prospective participants to
3 follow to qualify under the program. The application and detailed
4 guidance must be posted on the department website and local units
5 of government must be notified when application and detailed
6 guidance materials are available.

7 (3) The department shall provide a report that includes, at a
8 minimum, individual grantees, grant amounts, and a detailed
9 description of the project. The report shall be transmitted to the
10 senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees,
11 the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office
12 not later than September 30, 2021.

13 (4) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for water and
14 sewer replacement grants are designated as a work project
15 appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not
16 lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for
17 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects
18 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section
19 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
20 18.1451a:

21 (a) The purpose of the project is to provide grants to local
22 units of government for eligible water and sewer replacement
23 projects.

24 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing state
25 employees or contracts with service providers, or both.

26 (c) The total estimated cost of this project is
27 \$250,000,000.00.

28 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.
