- (3) (2) The application for a construction permit shall 1 2 contain the name and residence of the applicant, the location of the proposed disposal area, the design capacity of the disposal 3 area, and other information specified by rule. A person may apply 4 5 to construct more than 1 type of disposal area at the same facility 6 under a single permit. The An application for a construction permit 7 for a landfill shall be accompanied by an engineering plan and a 8 construction permit application fee . A construction permit 9 application for a landfill shall be accompanied by a fee in an 10 amount that is the sum of all of the following fees, as 11 applicable: in the following amount:

 - (8) (7) The department shall deposit permit application fees collected under this section in the solid waste staff account of the solid waste management fund. established in section 11550.
 - (9) The department shall not approve an application for a construction permit for a new type II landfill that is not contiquous to an already permitted type II landfill or for a new municipal solid waste incinerator unless the approval is requested by the county board of commissioners and the department determines that the landfill or incinerator is needed for the planning area.

- 3 exhausted. The department's determination of need shall be based on

- 15 (b) On 2 or more properties owned by the same person if the 16 properties are connected by a right-of-way that the owner controls 17 and to which the public does not have access.
- 18 Sec. 11510. (1) Before the submission of submitting a
- 19 construction permit application under section 11509 for a new
- 20 disposal area, the applicant a person shall request a local health
- 21 officer or the department to provide an advisory analysis of the
- 22 proposed disposal area. However, the applicant, not less than
- 23 Beginning 15 days after the request, and notwithstanding an
- 24 analysis result, the person may file an application for a
- 25 construction permit.
- (2) Upon receipt of a construction permit application, thedepartment shall do all of the following:

          (e) Notify the Michigan aeronautics commission if the disposal

- 12 (5) The department may authorize the addition of liquids, 13 including, but not limited to, septage waste or other liquid waste, 14 to solid waste in an RDDP if the applicant has demonstrated that 15 the addition is necessary to accelerate or enhance the 16 biostabilization of the solid waste and is not merely a means of 17 disposal of the liquid. The department may require that the septage waste, or any other liquid waste, added to an RDDP originate within 18 19 the county where the RDDP is located or any county contiguous to 20 the county where the RDDP is located. liquids. - 8 detrimental to the biostabilization of the solid waste intended to
- 9 be disposed of or to the RDDP goals.
- 10 (iii) An explanation of how the detrimental waste described in
- 11 subparagraph (ii) will be prevented from being disposed of in cells
- 12 approved for the RDDP.
- 13 (c) Parameters, such as moisture content, stability, gas
- 14 production, and settlement, that will be used by the department to
- 15 determine the beginning of the postclosure period for the RDDP
- 16 under subsection (10).
- 17 (d) Information to ensure that the requirements of subsection
- **18** (6) will be met.
- 19 (6) An RDDP shall meet all of the following requirements:
- 20 (a) Ensure that added liquids are evenly distributed and that
- 21 side slope breakout of liquids is prevented.
- 22 (b) Ensure that daily cover practices or disposal of low
- 23 permeability solid wastes does not adversely affect the free
- 24 movement of liquids and gases within the waste mass.
- 25 (c) Include all of the following:
- (i) A means to monitor the moisture content and temperature of
- 27 the waste.
- (ii) A leachate collection system of adequate size for the
- 29 anticipated increased liquid production rates. The design's factor

- 1 of safety shall take into account the anticipated increased
 2 operational temperatures and other factors as appropriate.
- 3 (iii) A means to monitor the depth of leachate on the liner.
- 4 (iv) An $\frac{integrated}{integrated}$ active gas collection and control system.
- 5 The system shall be of adequate size for the anticipated methane
- 6 production rates and to control odors. The system shall must be
- 7 operational before the addition of any material to accelerate or
- 8 enhance biostabilization of the solid waste.
- **9** (7) The owner or operator of an RDDP for which a construction
- 10 permit has been issued shall submit a report to the director
- 11 department at least once every 12 months on the progress of the
- 12 RDDP in achieving its goals. The report shall include a summary of
- 13 all monitoring and testing results, as well as any other operating
- 14 information specified by the director in the permit or in a
- 15 subsequent permit modification or operating condition.
- 16 (8) A permit for an RDDP shall specify the term of the permit,
- 17 which shall not exceed 3 years. However, the owner or operator of
- 18 an RDDP may apply for and the department may grant an extension of
- 19 the term of the permit, subject to all of the following
- 20 requirements:
- 21 (a) The application to extend the term of the permit must be
- 22 received by the department at least 90 days before the expiration
- 23 of the permit.
- 24 (b) The application shall include a detailed assessment of the
- 25 RDDP showing the progress of the RDDP in achieving its goals, a
- 26 list of problems with the RDDP and progress toward resolving those
- 27 problems, and other information that the director department

- 1 (c) If the department fails to make a final decision within 90
 2 days of after receipt of an administratively complete application
 3 for an extension of the term of a permit, the term of the permit is extended for 3 years.
- 5 (d) An individual extension shall not exceed 3 years, and the6 total term of the permit with all extensions shall not exceed 217 years.
- 9 goals of an RDDP, including, but not limited to, protection of
 10 human the environment, natural resources, and the public health, or
 11 the environment, safety, and welfare, are not being achieved, the
 12 director department may order immediate termination of all or part
 13 of the operations of the RDDP or may order other corrective
 14 measures.

- RDDP begins when the department determines that the unit or portion of the unit where the RDDP was authorized has reached a condition similar to the condition that non-RDDP landfills would reach prior to before postclosure. The parameters, such as moisture content, stability, gas production, and settlement, to attain this condition shall be specified in the permit. The perpetual landfill care fund required under section 11525—shall be maintained for the period after final closure of the landfill as specified under section 11525.11523(1)(a).

- 7 the design plans and engineering reports into the landfill's solid
- 8 waste disposal area construction permit and solid waste disposal
- 9 area operating license.

- 2 items. If, during construction, conditions require that any of the
- 3 approved or proposed extraction well locations deviate more than 50

- 7 (a) A statement from a licensed professional engineer that the
- 8 gas wells installed will provide adequate control of landfill gas
- 9 emissions and meet the intent of the design.

- 11 meet the design requirements included with the approved engineering

- 13 (5) Within 180 days after completion of construction of
- 14 portions of the active gas collection and control system, the owner
- 15 or operator shall submit to the department a documentation report
- 16 by a construction quality assurance officer or other department-
- 17 approved designee of the landfill owner or operator that the
- 18 construction complies with part 115 and the engineering plans
- 19 approved by the department. All of the following information shall
- 20 accompany the documentation report:
- 21 (a) A daily activity log, containing all of the information
- 22 required by R 299.4921(3) of the MAC.
- 23 (b) Landfill gas well logs that include all of the following:
- 24 (i) Observations of the depth, composition, degree of decay,
- 25 temperature, and moisture content of the waste.
- (ii) Details of the construction of the well including borehole
- 27 size and depth, pipe size and type, perforated length, aggregates
- 28 utilized, soils utilized, and the location and types of seals
- 29 utilized.

- 1 (c) An as-built engineering plan view of the active gas
 2 collection and control system with the location of existing wells
 3 and headers and the location of newly installed wells, headers, and
- 4 other active gas collection and control system infrastructure.
- 5 Sec. 11512h. (1) The owner or operator of a type II landfill
- 6 shall begin operating and monitoring an active gas collection and
- 7 control system in compliance with the following schedule:
- 8 (a) If the landfill is described in section 11512f(1)(a),
- 9 within 90 days after the date of approval of the revised
- 10 engineering plans.
- 11 (b) If the landfill is described in section 11512f(1)(b),
- 12 within 1 year after the effective date of the amendatory act that
- 13 added this section.
- 14 (2) The owner or operator of a type II landfill without an
- 15 active gas collection and control system shall begin surface
- 16 emission scans within 1 year after the effective date of the
- 17 amendatory act that added this section.
- 18 (3) The owner or operator of a type II landfill shall install
- 19 an active gas collection and control system in compliance with the
- 20 following schedule:
- 21 (a) If the landfill is a new unit, a lateral expansion, or a
- 22 lateral extension and if the approved design plan includes an
- 23 active gas collection and control system, the initial active gas
- 24 collection and control system must be installed before waste is
- 25 accepted. An initial active gas collection and control system may
- 26 include horizontal collectors installed directly above the leachate
- 27 collection system or vacuum applied to the leachate collection

- 7 allow disposal in the landfill of, any of the following:

- 9 (b) A lead acid battery as defined in section 17101.
- 10 (c) Low-level radioactive waste as defined in section 2 of the 11 low-level radioactive waste authority act, 1987 PA 204, MCL

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Postclosure care shall be conducted for 30 years, except as

- (c) The landfill has achieved functional stability, including,
- 27 but not limited to, meeting all of the following requirements:
- 28 (i) There has been no release from the landfill into
- 29 groundwater or surface water requiring ongoing corrective action.

- 2 subsidence of waste in the unit that may result in ponding or

- 12 (vi) Leachate and gas collection and control system condensate
- 13 generation has ceased, leachate and condensate quality meets

- 27 diversion center. Notification shall be given upon initial
