A bill to amend 1967 PA 281, entitled "Income tax act of 1967,"

(MCL 206.1 to 206.713) by adding section 279.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- Sec. 279. (1) For the 2020 and 2021 tax years only, a taxpayer
- 2 who was a frontline worker may claim a credit against the tax
- 3 imposed under this part of \$500.00 for a single return or a joint
- 4 return if only 1 spouse was a frontline worker or \$1,000.00 for a
- 5 joint return if both spouses were frontline workers.

- 1 (2) The department shall prescribe the form and manner in
- 2 which a taxpayer shall claim a credit under this section. The
- 3 department may require reasonable proof from the taxpayer to verify
- 4 his or her employment as a frontline worker.
- 5 (3) If the credit allowed by this section exceeds the tax
- 6 liability of the taxpayer for the tax year, that portion of the
- 7 credit that exceeds the tax liability of the taxpayer for the tax
- 8 year must be refunded.
- 9 (4) As used in this section:
- 10 (a) "Essential industry" means any of the following
- 11 industries:
- (i) Chemical supply chains and safety. Employees critical to
- 13 the continued production, operation, maintenance, distribution, and
- 14 safe transport of chemical and raw basic chemical materials and
- 15 industrial gas supplies, protective cleaning and medical solution
- 16 supplies, and industrial and consumer goods, including, but not
- 17 limited to, employees of a chemical plant, laboratory, or
- 18 distribution facility.
- 19 (ii) Communications and information technology, including news
- 20 media. Employees critical to the continued infrastructure
- 21 development, installation, maintenance, and operation of
- 22 communication systems, including, but not limited to, employees of
- 23 the news media, telecom companies, command centers, client service
- 24 centers, or distribution facilities.
- 25 (iii) Critical manufacturing. Employees critical to the
- 26 manufacturing of critical materials and products that support other
- 27 essential industries, including, but not limited to, employees of
- 28 manufacturing or processing plants.
- 29 (iv) Defense industrial base. Employees critical to the

- 1 continued research and development, design, production, delivery,
- 2 and maintenance of military weapons systems, subsystems, and
- 3 components or parts to meet U.S. military requirements, including,
- 4 but not limited to, sanitary workers and maintenance staff,
- 5 security staff and personnel, and employees of defense contractors
- 6 or information technology companies.
- 7 (v) Energy. Employees critical to the continued development,
- 8 maintenance, safe transport, and delivery of the state's energy
- 9 supply and infrastructure, including necessary equipment and
- 10 supplies, including, but not limited to, employees of mining
- 11 companies, production facilities or power plants, distribution
- 12 facilities, or on- or off-shore drilling or renewable energy
- 13 companies.
- 14 (vi) Financial services. Employees critical to the continued
- 15 provision, processing, verification, and recording of financial
- 16 transactions and services, including, but not limited to, armored
- 17 cash carriers, workers providing electronic point of sale support,
- 18 and employees of banks, nonbank financial or lending companies,
- 19 call centers, or accounting firms.
- 20 (vii) Food and agriculture. Employees critical to the continued
- 21 safe transport, delivery, and sale of human and animal food,
- 22 beverage, and agricultural supplies and products, including, but
- 23 not limited to, employees who fulfill remote orders for goods and
- 24 curbside delivery or pickup or employees of grocery stores or
- 25 convenience stores, restaurants, farms or ranches, diesel/ethanol
- 26 facilities, storage facilities, sawmills, distribution facilities,
- 27 or laboratories.
- 28 (viii) Hazardous materials.
- 29 (ix) Health care and public health. Employees critical to the

- 1 continued operation and delivery of health care and public health
- 2 safety services, including, but not limited to, hygiene, hazardous
- 3 materials, and environmental health and employees of clinics,
- 4 hospitals, long-term care facilities, in-home care providers,
- 5 vendors, suppliers, or retail facilities for hygiene products and
- 6 medical goods, supplies, and materials, or cleaning and waste
- 7 management facilities.
- 8 (x) Law enforcement, public safety, and first responders.
- 9 Employees critical to the continued provision and support of
- 10 prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery services,
- 11 including, but not limited to, employees of police or fire
- 12 stations, prisons, security companies, distribution facilities
- 13 developing or supplying safety equipment or uniforms for all public
- 14 safety personnel, or vendors or suppliers who maintain and provide
- 15 services and supplies to public safety facilities.
- 16 (xi) Other community-based government operations and essential
- 17 functions. Employees critical to the continued function of local
- 18 and state government operations, including, but not limited to,
- 19 maintenance and safety inspection personnel and employees of local
- 20 government, state government, public education, including K-12 and
- 21 higher education, zoos or aquariums, or permitting, licensing, or
- 22 credentialing offices for frontline workers and their operations.
- 23 (xii) Public works. Employees critical to the continued
- 24 operation, construction, maintenance, or rehabilitation of critical
- 25 infrastructure, including, but not limited to, employees of
- 26 landfill operations, dam engineering or inspection companies,
- 27 construction companies, structural and bridge inspection companies,
- 28 or maintenance companies.
- 29 (xiii) Transportation and logistics. Employees critical to the

- 1 continued operation and maintenance of public transportation
- 2 systems and personal transportation services, including, but not
- 3 limited to, transportation network providers and employees of
- 4 warehouse facilities, transit companies, transportation repair
- 5 shops, taxi or ride-sharing companies, driving training and
- 6 education centers, or towing and recovery or roadside assistance
- 7 companies.
- 8 (xiv) Water and wastewater. Employees critical to the continued
- 9 operation and maintenance of drinking water, wastewater, and
- 10 drainage infrastructure, including, but not limited to, employees
- 11 of wastewater treatment or collection facilities, community water
- 12 system companies or facilities, or water distribution and testing
- 13 facilities.
- 14 (xv) Additional critical infrastructure workers. Other
- 15 employees identified in Executive Order No. 2020-21 and Executive
- 16 Order No. 2020-70 as follows:
- 17 (A) Employees providing childcare for other critical
- 18 infrastructure workers, including workers at disaster relief
- 19 childcare centers.
- 20 (B) Employees at suppliers, distribution centers, or service
- 21 providers.
- (C) Employees in the insurance industry unable to work
- 23 remotely.
- 24 (D) Employees for businesses or operations that provide
- 25 minimum basic needs to the economically disadvantaged or otherwise
- 26 needy individuals, individuals who need assistance as a result of
- 27 COVID-19, and people with disabilities.
- 28 (E) Employees critical to labor union functions unable to work
- 29 remotely.

- 1 (F) Employees at retail stores selling groceries, medical
- 2 supplies, and products necessary to maintain the safety,
- 3 sanitation, and basic operation of residences or motor vehicles,
- 4 including convenience stores, pet supply stores, auto supplies and
- 5 repair stores, hardware and home maintenance stores, and home
- 6 appliance retailers.
- 7 (G) Employees at laundromats, coin laundries, and dry
- 8 cleaners.
- 9 (H) Employees for garden stores, nurseries, lawn care, pest
- 10 control, and landscaping operations.
- 11 (I) Employees at motor vehicle dealerships or who deliver
- 12 motor vehicles to customers.
- 13 (J) Employees at hotels and motels.
- 14 (K) Maintenance workers and groundskeepers.
- 15 (L) Employees for moving or storage operations.
- 16 (b) "Frontline worker" means an individual who was employed in
- 17 an essential industry at least part-time for 11 of the 13 weeks
- 18 between April 1, 2020 and June 30, 2020 and was required to work
- 19 outside the home at least some time between April 1, 2020 and June
- 20 30, 2020.
- 21 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act is intended to be
- 22 retroactive and applies to tax years that begin on and after
- 23 January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2021.
