October 28, 2021, Introduced by Senator SHIRKEY and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make, supplement, and adjust appropriations for various state departments and agencies for the fiscal years ending September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2022; to provide for certain conditions on appropriations; and to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations.

2 Sec. 1202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized
3 under this part and part 1A and the departments, commissions,
4 boards, offices, and programs for which appropriations are made
5 under this part and part 1A are subject to the management and
6 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

7 Sec. 1203. If the state administrative board, acting under
8 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount
9 appropriated under part 1A, the legislature may, by a concurrent
10 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and
11 serving in each house, inter-transfer funds within part 1A for the

14 **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

15 Sec. 1301. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for behavioral
16 health provider recruitment, the department of health and human services
17 shall make 1-time payments to health care providers of up to \$250,000.00
18 to cover the costs of hiring new positions in the behavioral health field.

19 (2) Funds appropriated for behavioral health provider recruitment
20 shall be considered work project funds and shall not lapse at the close of
21 the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for projects under
22 this section until the projects have been completed. The following is in
23 compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
24 431, MCL 18.1451a:

25 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding for grants
26 to reimburse hiring costs for health care providers for new behavioral
27 health provider staff.

28 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants to health care
29 providers.

1 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$15,000,000.00.

2 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

3 Sec. 1302. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for clinical
4 integration fund, the department of health and human services shall issue
5 grants to facilities and providers that wish to clinically integrate their
6 setting with physical and behavioral health services and providers.

7 (2) Funds appropriated for clinical integration fund shall be
8 considered work project funds and shall not lapse at the close of the
9 fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for projects under
10 this section until the projects have been completed. The following is in
11 compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
12 431, MCL 18.1451a:

13 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding for grants
14 to help cover costs to facilities and providers that wish to clinically
15 integrate their setting with physical and behavioral health services and
16 providers.

17 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants to health care
18 providers and facilities.

19 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$25,000,000.00.

20 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

21 (3) The funds appropriated in part 1A for clinical integration fund
22 must not be spent or otherwise distributed unless all of the following
23 bills of the 101st Legislature are enacted into law:

24 (a) Senate Bill No. 597.

25 (b) Senate Bill No. 598.

26 Sec. 1303. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for community
27 mental health services programs integration readiness, the department of
28 health and human services shall provide 1-time funding to support
29 community mental health services programs' efforts to make system,

1 information technology, staffing, and administrative improvements for
2 integration readiness.

3 (2) Funds appropriated for community mental health services programs
4 integration readiness shall be considered work project funds and shall not
5 lapse at the close of the fiscal year and shall be available for
6 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects have been
7 completed. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
8 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

9 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding to
10 community mental health services programs to make improvements for
11 integration readiness.

12 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants provided to
13 community mental health services programs.

14 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$50,000,000.00.

15 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

16 (3) The funds appropriated in part 1A for community mental health
17 services programs integration readiness must not be spent or otherwise
18 distributed unless all of the following bills of the 101st Legislature are
19 enacted into law:

20 (a) Senate Bill No. 597.

21 (b) Senate Bill No. 598.

22 Sec. 1304. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for community
23 substance use disorder prevention, education, and treatment grants, the
24 department of health and human services shall provide funding, pursuant to
25 federal laws, rules, and regulations, including awards to private entities
26 that have contracts to provide community-based substance use disorder
27 services.

28 (2) Funds appropriated for community substance use disorder
29 prevention, education, and treatment grants shall be considered work

1 project funds and shall not lapse at the close of the fiscal year and
2 shall be available for expenditures for projects under this section until
3 the projects have been completed. The following is in compliance with
4 section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
5 18.1451a:

6 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding to private
7 entities that have contracts to provide community-based substance use
8 disorder services.

9 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants to eligible
10 providers.

11 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$10,000,000.00.

12 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

13 Sec. 1305. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for crisis
14 stabilization units, the department of health and human services shall
15 create a 1-time grant pool for entities interested in establishing crisis
16 stabilization units as described in chapter 9A of the mental health code,
17 1974 PA 258, MCL 330.1971 to 330.1979. Any qualified provider in this
18 state shall be eligible to apply for a portion of the funding.

19 (2) Funds appropriated for crisis stabilization units shall be
20 considered work project funds and shall not lapse at the close of the
21 fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for projects under
22 this section until the projects have been completed. The following is in
23 compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
24 431, MCL 18.1451a:

25 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding to
26 establish crisis stabilization units.

27 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants to eligible
28 providers.

29 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$10,000,000.00.

1 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

2 (3) As used in this section, "crisis stabilization unit" means that
3 term as defined in section 100a of the mental health code, 1974 PA 258,
4 MCL 330.1100a.

5 Sec. 1306. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for department
6 of health and human services integration readiness, the department of
7 health and human services shall make 1-time investments to support
8 implementation of Senate Bill No. 597 of the 101st Legislature and Senate
9 Bill No. 598 of the 101st Legislature. The funding appropriated in part 1A
10 shall be used to harness external support for study and plan development,
11 project management, information technology system enhancements, and
12 administrative investments.

13 (2) Funds appropriated for department of health and human services
14 integration readiness shall be considered work project funds and shall not
15 lapse at the close of the fiscal year and shall be available for
16 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects have been
17 completed. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
18 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

19 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding to the
20 department of health and human services to make improvements for
21 integration readiness.

22 (b) The projects will be accomplished by utilizing state employees
23 or contracts with service providers, or both.

24 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$10,000,000.00.

25 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

26 (3) The funds appropriated in part 1A for department of health and
27 human services integration readiness must not be spent or otherwise
28 distributed unless all of the following bills of the 101st Legislature are
29 enacted into law:

1 (a) Senate Bill No. 597.

2 (b) Senate Bill No. 598.

3 Sec. 1307. The funds appropriated in part 1A for Hawthorn Center
4 expansion shall be used to support capital improvements to expand capacity
5 at the Hawthorn Center. This funding shall be used to increase both
6 staffing and bed capacity.

7 Sec. 1308. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for hospital
8 infrastructure enhancements, funding shall be used to create a 1-time
9 grant pool. Hospitals shall be allowed to apply for grants from the fund
10 to be used to invest in infrastructure necessary to improve care for
11 behavioral health patients who enter through the hospital's emergency
12 department. Grants may be used for initiatives such as providing emergency
13 department entrances and emergency department rooms for behavioral health
14 patients that are separate from the emergency department entrances and
15 emergency department rooms for the general patient population.

16 (2) Funds appropriated for the hospital infrastructure enhancements
17 shall be considered work project funds and shall not lapse at the close of
18 the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for projects under
19 this section until the projects have been completed. The following is in
20 compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
21 431, MCL 18.1451a:

22 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding for grants
23 to hospitals to invest in infrastructure necessary to improve care for
24 behavioral health patients who enter through the hospital's emergency
25 department.

26 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants to hospitals.

27 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$20,000,000.00.

28 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

29 Sec. 1309. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for

1 infrastructure grants to enhance pediatric inpatient services, funding
2 shall be used to create a competitive grant program for health care
3 providers to increase the number of slots in long-term pediatric
4 psychiatric inpatient hospitals, centers, or psychiatric residential
5 treatment facilities by a total of at least 120 slots statewide. Grant
6 applicants must identify 20% matching funds as part of the grant
7 application. A single facility shall not receive more than \$25,000,000.00
8 of the funding appropriated in part 1A, and the grants must be made to
9 different geographic regions of this state.

10 (2) The department of health and human services shall determine and
11 publish the evidence-based treatment care and services program for the
12 population to be served by the slots described in subsection (1) not later
13 than 6 months after the effective date of this act.

14 (3) Funds appropriated for infrastructure grants to enhance
15 pediatric inpatient services shall be considered work project funds and
16 shall not lapse at the close of the fiscal year and shall be available for
17 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects have been
18 completed. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
19 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

20 (a) The purpose of the work project is to implement a competitive
21 grant funding program for health care providers to increase the number of
22 long-term pediatric psychiatric inpatient slots online across this state.

23 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants to health care
24 facilities.

25 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$100,000,000.00.

26 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

27 (4) As used in this section, "health care provider" means an entity
28 that is licensed under part 215 of the public health code, 1978 PA 368,
29 MCL 333.21501 to 333.21571, or section 137 of the mental health code, 1974

1 PA 258, MCL 330.1137.

2 Sec. 1310. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for jail
3 diversion fund, the department shall allocate \$15,000,000.00 to the jail
4 diversion fund. The jail diversion fund shall be administered by the
5 mental health diversion council, in accordance with recommendations of the
6 Michigan joint task force on jail and pretrial incarceration.

7 (2) The mental health diversion council shall distribute grants to
8 local entities for the purpose of establishing or expanding jail diversion
9 programs in partnership with local law enforcement and private or public
10 behavioral health service providers. Grants must be distributed as
11 follows:

12 (a) 50% must be distributed to community-based mobile crisis
13 intervention services in partnership between law enforcement and mental
14 health practitioners. The mental health diversion council must give
15 priority to grant applications that demonstrate a commitment to a
16 comprehensive co-response model that includes at least all of the
17 following:

18 (i) Full integration with existing 911 dispatch centers.

19 (ii) Inclusion of both co-responder clinicians and co-responder
20 peers.

21 (iii) Access to residential treatment facilities.

22 (iv) Inclusion of telehealth response and follow-up services.

23 (v) Mental health professionals employed independently from law
24 enforcement.

25 (vi) Other best practices as identified by the mental health
26 diversion council.

27 (b) 50% must be distributed to any type of pre-arrest or post-arrest
28 diversion program in which individuals with behavioral health needs are
29 identified and diverted out of the criminal justice system. The mental

1 health diversion council must give priority to local entities located in
2 counties without an urbanized area of at least 50,000 people, according to
3 the most recent federal decennial census.

4 (3) Grant applications may be made by any applicable local entity
5 and must be distributed to local entities using a prospective payment
6 methodology.

7 (4) The department shall seek federal authority as outlined under
8 section 9813 of the American rescue plan act of 2021, 42 USC 1396w-6, to
9 utilize enhanced federal Medicaid matching funds for the operation of the
10 programs described in this section. It is the intent of the legislature
11 that local entities receiving grants under this section partner with
12 philanthropic organizations to supplement state funding.

13 (5) Local entities receiving grants under this section must submit a
14 report containing metrics pertinent to the progress of their diversion
15 program to the mental health diversion council annually. The council must
16 compile and submit an annual report to the senate and house appropriations
17 subcommittees on the department budget, the senate and house fiscal
18 agencies, the senate and house policy offices, and the state budget office
19 and make the report publicly available within 30 days after receiving the
20 report. Local entities may utilize a portion of grant funding received
21 under this section to contract with independent organizations for the
22 purpose of fulfilling this requirement. The mental health diversion
23 council shall determine the specific metrics required and notify the local
24 entities at the time of the first grant disbursement. Metrics for grants
25 may include, but are not limited to, all of the following:

26 (a) The number of calls to which co-responders are dispatched alone
27 and the number of calls to which co-responders are dispatched alongside
28 law enforcement.

29 (b) The number of calls transferred to telehealth co-responders with

1 physical response follow-up and the number of calls transferred to
2 telehealth co-responders without physical response follow-up.

3 (c) The law enforcement call clear time when co-responders are
4 dispatched, and the law enforcement call clear time when co-responders are
5 not dispatched.

6 (d) The co-responder, co-responder clinician, and co-responder peer
7 call time per call.

8 (e) The number of co-responder-attended calls resulting in the
9 following:

10 (i) Jail admission.

11 (ii) On-location de-escalation.

12 (iii) Crisis center or crisis stabilization unit residential
13 admission.

14 (iv) Behavioral health facility inpatient admission.

15 (v) Referral for behavioral or mental health services without
16 residential or inpatient admission.

17 (vi) Referral to community or social services such as homeless
18 shelters, women's shelters, food pantries, or other similar services.

19 (f) The number of individuals served by co-responder-attended calls
20 broken down by age, gender, and race and ethnicity.

21 (g) The reduction in frequency of law enforcement interaction with
22 known frequently served individuals.

23 (h) The number of follow-up visits, including method and location.

24 (i) The overall program costs broken down by administration,
25 training, co-responder clinician, co-responder, and per-call costs.

26 (6) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1A for jail diversion
27 fund are designated as a work project appropriation, and any unencumbered
28 or unallotted funds do not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and are
29 available for expenditures for projects under this section until the fund

1 is depleted. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
2 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

3 (a) The purpose of the project is to distribute grant funds to local
4 entities establishing or expanding jail diversion programs.

5 (b) The projects will be accomplished through grants to local
6 entities establishing or expanding jail diversion programs in partnership
7 with local law enforcement and private or public behavioral health service
8 providers.

9 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$15,000,000.00.

10 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

11 Sec. 1311. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for mental
12 health block grant, the department of health and human services shall
13 provide funding, pursuant to federal laws, rules, and regulations,
14 including awards to private entities that have contracts to provide
15 community-based mental health services.

16 (2) Funds appropriated for mental health block grant shall be
17 considered work project funds and shall not lapse at the close of the
18 fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for projects under
19 this section until the projects have been completed. The following is in
20 compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
21 431, MCL 18.1451a:

22 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding to private
23 entities that have contracts to provide community-based mental health
24 services.

25 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants to eligible
26 providers.

27 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$10,000,000.00.

28 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

29 Sec. 1312. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for Michigan

1 essential health provider loan repayment program, the department of health
2 and human services shall expand the Michigan essential health provider
3 repayment program to include designated mental health professionals in the
4 program pursuant to the Michigan essential health provider recruitment
5 strategy act, part 27 of the public health code, 1978 PA 368, MCL 333.2701
6 to 333.2727, as amended by Senate Bill No. 246 of the 101st Legislature
7 and Senate Bill No. 435 of the 101st Legislature.

8 (2) Funds appropriated for Michigan essential health provider loan
9 repayment program shall be considered work project funds and shall not
10 lapse at the close of the fiscal year and shall be available for
11 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects have been
12 completed. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
13 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

14 (a) The purpose of the work project is to provide funding for loan
15 repayment for designated mental health professionals.

16 (b) The projects will be accomplished by grants for loan repayment.

17 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is \$25,000,000.00.

18 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

19 (3) The funds appropriated in part 1A for Michigan essential health
20 provider loan repayment program must not be spent or otherwise distributed
21 unless all of the following bills of the 101st Legislature are enacted
22 into law:

23 (a) Senate Bill No. 246.

24 (b) Senate Bill No. 435.

25 Sec. 1313. From the funds appropriated in part 1A for northern
26 Michigan psychiatric hospital bed investment, \$5,000,000.00 shall be
27 allocated to a nonprofit Michigan health care system organized under the
28 laws of this state that is exempt from federal income tax under section
29 501(c) (3) of the internal revenue code of 1986, 26 USC 501, and that is

1 located in a county with a population between 26,000 and 27,000 and in a
2 city with a population between 4,500 and 5,000 according to the 2010
3 federal decennial census for the purpose of supporting at least 12 new
4 psychiatric beds.

5 Sec. 1314. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1A for
6 psychiatric residential treatment facilities, the department of health and
7 human services shall create a 1-time grant pool for entities interested in
8 establishing psychiatric residential treatment facilities as described in
