HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.249

Rep. Scott offered the following resolution: 1 A resolution to declare March 8, 2022, as International 2 Women's Day in the state of Michigan. 3 Whereas, March 8, 2022, marks the 111th anniversary of the celebration of International Women's Day. Originally began in 4 response to terrible working conditions and exploitation, 15,000 5 6 women took to the streets in New York protesting the terrible 7 working conditions they endured. It is celebrated on March 8 of 8 every year; and Whereas, International Women's Day is a global day celebrating 9 the economic, political, and social achievements of women in the 10 past, present, and future. It is a day when women are recognized 11 12 for their achievements, regardless of divisions, whether national, ethnic, linguistic, cultural, economic, or political. It is an 13

occasion for looking back on past struggles and accomplishments 1 2 and, more importantly, for looking ahead to the untapped potential and opportunities that await future generations of women; and 3 Whereas, In different regions the focus of the celebrations 4 5 ranges from general celebration of respect, appreciation, and love 6 towards women to a celebration for women's economic, political, and 7 social achievements; and Whereas, The earliest Women's Day observance was held in 1909 8 9 in New York and was organized in remembrance of the strike of the 10 International Ladies' Garment Workers Union. At the second 11 International Women's Conference in 1910, the first International Women's Day was officially established to promote equal rights, 12 13 including suffrage, for women. The following year, International 14 Women's Day was marked by over a million people in Austria, 15 Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland. The efforts of early European pioneers led to women gaining the right to vote and to hold public 16 office and the establishment of many early prohibitions against 17 18 employment sex discrimination; and Whereas, In 1975, during the United Nations (UN) International 19 20 Year for Women, the UN held its first official celebration of 21 International Women's Day. Two years later, in December 1977, the 22 General Assembly adopted a resolution proclaiming a United Nations 23 Day for Women's Rights and International Peace to be observed by 24 member states. In adopting this resolution, the General Assembly 25 recognized the role of women in peace efforts and development and 26 urged an end to discrimination and an increase of support for 27 women's full and equal participation; and 28 Whereas, Beginning in 1996, International Women's Day

organizers began adopting a theme to each year's celebrations that

- 1 reinforces its commitment to women's rights and world peace.
- 2 Successful campaigns centered on such themes as "Celebrating the
- 3 Past, Planning for the Future" (1996) and "Women in Decision-
- 4 Making" (2006); and
- 5 Whereas, Presidents of the United States have consecutively
- 6 declared March to be Women's History Month since 1988 after the
- 7 National Women's History Project petitioned the United States
- 8 Congress in 1987 for recognition of Women's History Month, and have
- 9 since announced the 2021 theme of "Valiant Women of the Vote:
- 10 Refusing to be Silenced continues to celebrate the Suffrage
- 11 Centennial"; and
- 12 Whereas, On the occasion of 2010 International Women's Day,
- 13 the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) drew attention
- 14 to the hardships displaced women endure by spreading awareness of
- 15 the displacement of populations as one of the gravest consequences
- 16 of today's armed conflicts; and
- 17 Whereas, There are more than 3.8 billion women in the world
- 18 today. Women around the world participate in the political, social,
- 19 and economic life of their communities, play a critical role in
- 20 providing and caring for their families, contribute substantially
- 21 to the growth of economies, and, as both farmers and caregivers,
- 22 play an important role in advancing food security for their
- 23 communities; and
- 24 Whereas, The advancement of women is a public policy priority
- 25 for our country and the state of Michigan and the ability of women
- 26 to realize their full potential is critical to the ability of a
- 27 country and state to achieve strong and lasting economic growth and
- 28 social stability; and
- 29 Whereas, 2020 saw an historic shattering of a glass ceiling

- 1 with the election of Kamala Harris as the first female Vice-
- 2 President of the United States. The hope is that someday soon the
- 3 ultimate glass ceiling will be shattered with the election of the
- 4 first female U.S. President; and
- 5 Whereas, Although strides have been made in recent decades,
- 6 women around the world continue to face significant obstacles in
- 7 all aspects of their lives, including underrepresentation in all
- 8 aspects of public life, denial of basic human rights, and
- 9 discrimination; and
- 10 Whereas, Despite some achievements by individual women
- 11 leaders, women around the world are still vastly underrepresented
- 12 in high level positions and in national and local legislatures and
- 13 governments and, according to the Inter-Parliamentary Union, women
- 14 account for only 25 percent of national parliamentarians; and
- Whereas, Women remain underrepresented in conflict prevention
- 16 and conflict resolution efforts, despite proven successes by women
- in conflict-affected regions in moderating violent extremism,
- 18 resolving disputes through non-violent mediation and negotiation,
- 19 and stabilizing their societies by improving access to peace and
- 20 security services, institutions, and decision-making venues; and
- 21 Whereas, March 8 is recognized each year as International
- 22 Women's Day, a global day to celebrate the economic, political, and
- 23 social achievements of women past, present, and future, and a day
- 24 to recognize the obstacles that women still face in the struggle
- 25 for equal rights and opportunities; now, therefore, be it
- 26 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of
- 27 this legislative body declare March 8, 2022, as International
- 28 Women's Day in the state of Michigan. We support the goals of
- 29 International Women's Day, recognize that the empowerment of women

- 1 is inextricably linked to the potential of countries to generate
- 2 economic growth, sustainable democracy, and inclusive security,
- 3 honor the women in the United States and around the world who have
- 4 worked throughout history to ensure that women are quaranteed
- 5 equality and basic human rights, reaffirm the movement's commitment
- 6 to ending discrimination and violence against women and girls, to
- 7 ensuring the safety and welfare of women and girls, and to pursuing
- 8 policies that guarantee the basic human rights of women and girls
- 9 worldwide, and encourage the people of Michigan to observe
- 10 International Women's Day with appropriate programs and activities.
