CONTENT

The bill would amend the Child Protection Law to do the following:

- -- Require the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to create training materials for individuals required to report suspected child abuse or neglect and make the materials publicly available on its website.
- -- Require an employer or organization to provide the training materials to an employee who was required to report.

Specifically, the bill would require the DHHS, in consultation with the Michigan Domestic and Sexual Violence Prevention and Treatment Board and the Michigan Coalition to End Domestic and Sexual Violence, to create comprehensive training materials for individuals who were required to report suspected child abuse or child neglect, within 180 days after the bill's effective date. The DHHS would have to make the training materials publicly available on its website in addition to any other form that it chose.

The bill would require an employer or organization that employed a mandatory reporter to provide the training materials to that employee. This requirement would not apply to an employer or organization that provided to an employee its own training that was updated annually based on the DHHS's materials. The bill would take effect 90 days after its enactment.

FISCAL IMPACT

The bill likely would result in a minor fiscal impact on the DHHS. Information provided by the DHHS indicates that, because it has developed and posted mandatory reporter training materials and resources on its website, the cost to create comprehensive training materials for mandatory reporters would be minimal. The DHHS will make these materials available; accordingly, there would be no fiscal impact on local units of government.
