## **SENATE BILL NO. 17**

January 17, 2023, Introduced by Senators WOJNO, MCCANN, CHANG, ANTHONY, HERTEL, KLINEFELT, MCMORROW, CHERRY, SANTANA, BAYER and POLEHANKI and referred to the Committee on Local Government.

A bill to amend 2011 PA 256, entitled "Michigan fireworks safety act,"

by amending sections 7 and 12 (MCL 28.457 and 28.462), section 7 as amended by 2018 PA 635 and section 12 as amended by 2019 PA 138.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 7. (1) Except as **otherwise** provided in this act, a local
- 2 unit of government shall not enact or enforce an ordinance, code,
- 3 or regulation pertaining that pertains to or regulates, in any
- 4 manner, regulating—the sale, display, storage, transportation, or

- 1 distribution of fireworks regulated under this act.
- 2 (2) A local unit of government may enact an ordinance
- 3 regulating that regulates the ignition, discharge, and use of
- 4 consumer fireworks, including, but not limited to, an ordinance
- 5 prescribing that prescribes the hours of the day or night during
- 6 which that a person may ignite, discharge, or use consumer
- 7 fireworks. If Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3), if a
- 8 local unit of government enacts an ordinance under this subsection,
- 9 the ordinance shall must not regulate the ignition, discharge, or
- 10 use of consumer fireworks on the following days after 11 a.m.:
- 11 (a) December 31 until 1 a.m. on January 1.
- 12 (b) The Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding Memorial Day
- until 11:45 11 p.m. on each of those days.
- 14 (c) June 29 to July 3 and July 4 until 11:45 p.m. on each of
- 15 those days.
- 16 (d) July 5, if that date is a Friday or Saturday, until 11:45
- 17 p.m.
- 18 (e) The Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding Labor Day
- 19 until 11:45 p.m. on each of those days.
- 20 (3) A local unit of government with a population density of
- 21 over 3,400 residents per square mile may enact an ordinance that
- 22 regulates the ignition, discharge, or use of consumer fireworks,
- 23 except on the following days:
- 24 (a) December 31 until 1 a.m. on January 1.
- 25 (b) Memorial Day until 11 p.m.
- 26 (c) July 4 until 11:45 p.m.
- 27 (d) Labor Day until 11:45 p.m.
- 28 (4) (3) An ordinance under subsection (2) shall or (3) must
- 29 impose a civil fine of \$1,000.00 \$2,000.00 for each violation of

- the ordinance and no other fine or sanction. The ordinance must
  provide for the remittance of \$500.00 \$1,000.00 of the fine
- 3 collected under the ordinance to the local law enforcement agency
- 4 responsible for enforcing the ordinance.
- 5 (5) (4) Beginning August 1, 2019, a A local unit of government
- 6 with a population of 100,000 or more or a local unit of government
- 7 located in a county with a population of 750,000 or more may enact
- 8 or enforce an ordinance that regulates the use of a temporary
- 9 structure. An ordinance established under this subsection may
- 10 include, but is not limited to, a restriction on the number of
- 11 permits issued for a temporary structure, regulation of the
- 12 distance required between 2 or more temporary structures, or a
- 13 zoning ordinance that regulates the use of a temporary structure.
- 14 An ordinance established under this subsection may not prohibit the
- 15 temporary storage, transportation, or distribution of fireworks by
- 16 a consumer fireworks certificate holder at a retail location that
- 17 is a permanent building or structure. As used in this subsection,
- 18 "temporary structure" means a movable structure that is used in the
- 19 sale, display, storage, transportation, or distribution of
- 20 fireworks, including, but not limited to, a tent or a stand.
- 21 Sec. 12. (1) A person shall not ignite, discharge, or use
- 22 consumer fireworks on public property, school property, church
- 23 property, or the property of another person without that
- 24 organization's or person's express permission to use those
- 25 fireworks on those premises. Except as otherwise provided in this
- 26 section, a person that violates this subsection is responsible for
- 27 a state civil infraction and may be ordered to pay a civil fine of
- 28 not more than \$500.00.\$1,000.00.
- 29 (2) A person shall not sell consumer fireworks to a minor. A

- 1 person that violates this subsection shall be ordered to pay a
- 2 civil fine of not more than \$1,000.00, \$2,500.00, or, for a second
- 3 or subsequent violation of this subsection, a civil fine of not
- 4 more than \$2,500.00.\$5,000.00. For a second or subsequent
- 5 violation, the department shall suspend the person's consumer
- 6 fireworks certificate, if that person holds a consumer fireworks
- 7 certificate, for 90 days beginning on the date a civil fine is
- 8 ordered. The age of an individual purchasing who purchases consumer
- 9 fireworks shall must be verified by any of the following:
- 10 (a) An operator's or chauffeur's license issued under the 11 Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.1 to 257.923.
- 12 (b) An official state personal identification card issued 13 under 1972 PA 222, MCL 28.291 to 28.300.
- 14 (c) An enhanced driver license or enhanced official state
  15 personal identification card issued under the enhanced driver
- 16 license and enhanced official state personal identification card
- 17 act, 2008 PA 23, MCL 28.301 to 28.308.
- 18 (d) A military identification card.
- 19 (e) A passport.
- 20 (f) Any other bona fide photograph identification that
  21 establishes the identity and age of the individual.
- 22 (3) An individual shall not discharge, ignite, or use consumer
- 23 fireworks or low-impact fireworks while under the influence of
- 24 alcoholic liquor, a controlled substance, or a combination of
- 25 alcoholic liquor and a controlled substance. A person that An
- 26 individual who violates this subsection is responsible for a state
- 27 civil infraction and may be ordered to pay a civil fine of not more
- 28 than \$1,000.00. As used in this subsection:
- 29 (a) "Alcoholic liquor" means that term as defined in section

- 1 d of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.1d.
- 2 (b) "Controlled substance" means that term as defined in
- 3 section 8b of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.8b.
- 4 (4) An individual who violates the smoking prohibition
- 5 described in NFPA 1124, 7.3.11.1, regardless of the type or
- 6 quantity of consumer or low-impact fireworks present, is
- 7 responsible for a civil fine of \$1,000.00.
- **8** (5) Signage stating the smoking prohibition described in
- 9 subsection (4) satisfies the requirements of NFPA 1124.
- 10 (6) A person shall not ignite, discharge, or use consumer
- 11 fireworks or low-impact fireworks in a manner that is intended to
- 12 harass, scare, or injure livestock. As used in this subsection,
- 13 "livestock" means that term as defined in section 3 of the animal
- 14 industry act, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.703.
