## **SENATE BILL NO. 404**

June 22, 2023, Introduced by Senators GEISS, CAMILLERI, CHANG and MOSS and referred to the Committee on Elections and Ethics.

A bill to amend 1954 PA 116, entitled "Michigan election law,"

by amending sections 726, 736, 751, and 931 (MCL 168.726, 168.736, 168.751, and 168.931), section 931 as amended by 1996 PA 583, and by adding sections 726a, 753, and 753a; and to repeal acts and parts of acts.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 726. No ballots shall Except as otherwise provided in
- 2 this act, a ballot must not be delivered to an elector by any

- 1 person\_individual other than 1 of the election inspectors of
- 2 election and only within in the polling place. , except as provided
- 3 in this act for absent voters' ballots.
- 4 Sec. 726a. (1) An elector who is 65 years of age or older, or
- 5 an elector who has a disability, may request to vote the elector's
- 6 ballot using curbside voting at the elector's polling place or
- 7 early voting site. An elector may request to use curbside voting in
- 8 any of the following ways:
- 9 (a) By calling the appropriate city or township clerk's office
- 10 during regular business hours.
- 11 (b) By sending another individual into the elector's polling
- 12 place or early voting site to indicate to the election inspectors
- 13 that the elector wishes to use curbside voting.
- 14 (c) Any other appropriate method authorized by the secretary
- 15 of state at least 120 days before the election.
- 16 (d) Any other appropriate method authorized by the appropriate
- 17 city or township clerk.
- 18 (2) Curbside voting must be available to electors during all
- 19 hours that a polling place or early voting site is open.
- 20 (3) An elector must not be required to disclose the reason for
- 21 requesting curbside voting and must not be required to provide
- 22 evidence or documentation of the elector's age or disability to use
- 23 curbside voting.
- 24 (4) Curbside voting must be conducted in an area designated by
- 25 the appropriate city or township clerk that is located within 200
- 26 feet of any entrance to a polling place or early voting site. The
- 27 area designated must include a sign indicating that the area is
- 28 designated for curbside voting only. If the area designated for
- 29 curbside voting is located more than 100 feet from any entrance to

- 1 a polling place or early voting site, an individual shall not
- 2 conduct any of the activities prohibited under section 744 within
- 3 10 feet of a vehicle parked in the area designated for curbside
- 4 voting.
- 5 (5) When the election inspectors at a polling place or early
- 6 voting site become aware that an elector described in subsection
- 7 (1) is outside of the polling place or early voting site and wishes
- 8 to use curbside voting, the following procedure must be used:
- 9 (a) Except as otherwise provided in this subdivision, 2
- 10 election inspectors, 1 from each major political party, must go to
- 11 the elector's vehicle outside of the polling place or early voting
- 12 site and verify the elector's registration status. If 1 election
- 13 inspector from each major political party is not immediately
- 14 available, 2 election inspectors, regardless of political party
- 15 affiliation, may go to the elector's vehicle outside of the polling
- 16 place or early voting site to verify the elector's registration
- 17 status.
- 18 (b) If the elector's registration status is confirmed, the
- 19 election inspectors must provide that elector with a ballot to vote
- 20 and a secrecy envelope.
- 21 (c) The elector shall mark the ballot in the presence of both
- 22 election inspectors, but in a manner that protects the secrecy of
- 23 the ballot.
- 24 (d) Once the elector has completed marking the elector's
- 25 ballot, the elector shall return the marked ballot in a secrecy
- 26 envelope to the election inspectors.
- 27 (e) The election inspectors shall immediately return to the
- 28 polling place or early voting site and deposit the marked ballot
- 29 into the ballot tabulator.

(f) Once the ballot is tabulated, the election inspectors 1 2 shall return to the elector's vehicle and indicate to the elector that the elector's ballot was tabulated and provide that elector 3 4 with written proof that the elector's ballot was tabulated. 5 Sec. 736. (2) If an elector is so—disabled on account of blindness, the elector may be assisted in the marking of his or her—the elector's ballot by a member of his or her—the elector's immediate family or

- 1 by a person an individual over 18 years of age designated by the
- 2 blind person.elector.
- 3 (3) Beginning on the effective date of the amendatory act that
- 4 added this subsection, an elector may seek language assistance from
- 5 an individual the elector chooses in order to exercise the
- 6 elector's right to vote.
- 7 (4) Beginning on the effective date of the amendatory act that
- 8 added this subsection, an elector may bring any individual into the
- 9 voting booth or voting compartment at an election to assist that
- 10 elector in participating in the electoral process. An election
- 11 inspector may confirm with the elector that the individual is of
- 12 the elector's choice to assist that elector.
- 13 Sec. 753. (1) A nonprofit or nonpartisan entity that is not a
- 14 political committee may offer or provide transportation for an
- 15 elector to and from any of the following for voting purposes:
- 16 (a) A polling place location.
- 17 (b) An early voting site.
- 18 (c) An absent voter ballot drop box.
- 19 (d) A city or township clerk's office.
- 20 (2) As used in this section, "political committee" means any
- 21 of the following:
- 22 (a) A committee as that term is defined under section 3 of the
- 23 Michigan campaign finance act, 1976 PA 388, MCL 169.203.
- 24 (b) An entity that is tax-exempt under section 527 of the
- 25 internal revenue code of 1986, 26 USC 527.
- 26 Sec. 753a. An individual may provide food, entertainment,
- 27 warmth, or other necessities to electors who are in line to vote at
- 28 a polling place location, an early voting site, or a city or
- 29 township clerk's office.

- 1 Sec. 931. (1) A person An individual who violates 1 or more of 2 the following subdivisions is quilty of a misdemeanor:
- (a) A person An individual shall not, either directly or
   indirectly, give, lend, or promise valuable consideration to or
   for any person, individual as an inducement to influence the manner
   of voting by a person an individual relative to a candidate or
- 7 ballot question —or as a reward for refraining from voting.
- 8 (b) A person An individual shall not, either before, on, or
  9 after an election, for the person's individual's own benefit or on
  10 behalf of any other person, individual, receive, agree, or contract
  11 for valuable consideration for 1 or more of the following:
- 12 (i) Voting or agreeing to vote, or inducing or attempting to13 induce another to vote, at an election.
- 14 (ii) Refraining or agreeing to refrain, or inducing or 15 attempting to induce another to refrain, from voting at an 16 election.
- 17 (iii) Doing anything prohibited by this act.

- 18 (*iv*) Both distributing absent voter ballot applications to
  19 voters electors and receiving signed applications from voters
  20 electors for delivery to the appropriate clerk or assistant of the
  21 clerk. This subparagraph does not apply to an authorized election
  22 official.
  - (c) A person An individual shall not solicit any valuable consideration from a candidate for nomination for, or election to, an office described in this act. This subdivision does not apply to requests for contributions of money by or to an authorized representative of the political party committee of the organization to which the candidate belongs. This subdivision does not apply to a regular business transaction between a candidate and any other

- person individual that is not intended for, or connected with, the
  securing of votes or the influencing of voters in connection with
  the nomination or election.
- 4 (d) A person An individual shall not, either directly or
  5 indirectly, discharge or threaten to discharge an employee of the
  6 person individual for the purpose of influencing the employee's
  7 vote at an election.

- (e) A priest, pastor, curate, or other officer of a religious society shall not for the purpose of influencing a voter an elector at an election, impose or threaten to impose upon the voter elector a penalty of excommunication, dismissal, or expulsion —or command or advise the voter, elector under pain of religious disapproval.
- (f) A person shall not hire a motor vehicle or other conveyance or cause the same to be done, for conveying voters, other than voters physically unable to walk, to an election.
- (f) (g)—In a city, township, village, or school district that has a board of election commissioners authorized to appoint inspectors of election, an inspector of election, a clerk, or other election official who accepts an appointment as an inspector of election shall not fail to report at the polling place designated on election morning at the time specified by the board of election commissioners, unless excused as provided in this subdivision. A person An individual who violates this subdivision is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$10.00 or imprisonment for not more than 10 days, or both. An inspector of election, clerk, or other election official who accepts an appointment as an inspector of election day and is not subject to a fine or imprisonment under this subdivision if 1 or more of the

- 1 following requirements are met:
- $\mathbf{2}$  (i) The inspector of election, clerk, or other election
- 3 official notifies the board of election commissioners or other
- 4 officers in charge of elections of his or her the inability to
- 5 serve at the time and place specified, 3 days or more before the
- 6 election.
- 7 (ii) The inspector of election, clerk, or other election
- 8 official is excused from duty by the board of election
- 9 commissioners or other officers in charge of elections for cause
- 10 shown.
- 11 (g) (h) A person An individual shall not willfully fail to
- 12 perform a duty imposed upon that person individual by this act 7 or
- 13 disobey a lawful instruction or order of the secretary of state as
- 14 chief state election officer or of a board of county election
- 15 commissioners, board of city election commissioners, or board of
- 16 inspectors of election.
- 17 (h) (i)—A delegate or member of a convention shall not solicit
- 18 a candidate for nomination before the convention for money, reward,
- 19 position, place, preferment, or other valuable consideration in
- 20 return for support by the delegate or member in the convention. A
- 21 candidate or other person\_individual shall not promise or give to a
- 22 delegate money, reward, position, place, preferment, or other
- 23 valuable consideration in return for support by or vote of the
- 24 delegate in the convention.
- 25 (i) (j) A person An individual elected to the office of
- 26 delegate to a convention shall not accept or receive any money or
- 27 other valuable consideration for his or her the individual's vote
- 28 as a delegate.
- 29 (j) (k) A person—An individual shall not, while the polls are

- 1 open on an election day, solicit votes in a polling place or within
- 2 100 feet from an entrance to the building in which a polling place
- 3 is located.
- 4 (k) (1) A person An individual shall not keep a room or
- 5 building for the purpose, in whole or in part, of recording or
- 6 registering bets or wagers, or of selling pools upon on the result
- 7 of a political nomination, appointment, or election. A person An
- 8 individual shall not wager property, money, or thing of value, or
- 9 be the custodian of money, property, or thing of value —staked,
- 10 wagered, or pledged upon on the result of a political nomination,
- 11 appointment, or election.
- 12 (l) (m) A person An individual shall not participate in a
- 13 meeting or a portion of a meeting of more than 2 persons,
- 14 individuals, other than the person's individual's immediate family,
- 15 at which an absent voter ballot is voted.
- 16 (m) (n) A person, An individual, other than an authorized
- 17 election official, shall not, either directly or indirectly, give,
- 18 lend, or promise any valuable consideration to or for a person an
- 19 individual to induce that person individual to both distribute
- 20 absent voter ballot applications to voters electors and receive
- 21 signed absent voter ballot applications from voters electors for
- 22 delivery to the appropriate clerk.
- 23 (2) A person An individual who violates a provision of this
- 24 act for which a penalty is not otherwise specifically provided in
- 25 this act —is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 26 (3) A person or a person's agent who knowingly makes,
- 27 publishes, disseminates, circulates, or places before the public,
- 28 or knowingly causes directly or indirectly to be made, published,
- 29 disseminated, circulated, or placed before the public, in this

- 1 state, either orally or in writing, an assertion, representation,
- 2 or statement of fact concerning a candidate for public office at an
- 3 election in this state, that is false, deceptive, scurrilous, or
- 4 malicious, without the true name of the author being subscribed to
- 5 the assertion, representation, or statement if written, or
- 6 announced if unwritten, is quilty of a misdemeanor.
- 7 (3) (4)—As used in this section, "valuable consideration"
- 8 includes, but is not limited to, money, property, a gift, a prize
- 9 or chance for a prize, a fee, a loan, an office, a position, an
- appointment, or employment.
- 11 Enacting section 1. Section 579 of the Michigan election law,
- 12 1954 PA 116, MCL 168.579, is repealed.
- 13 Enacting section 2. This amendatory act does not take effect
- 14 unless Senate Bill No. 401 of the 102nd Legislature is enacted into
- **15** law.
