- 4 in 1915, and in earnest in 1924 when Dr. Carter G. Woodson, through
- 5 his beloved Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., created Negro History
- 6 and Literature Week in the United States. Since 1976, every United
- 7 States President has adopted the month of February as Black History
- 8 Month, an annual celebration of African-American achievements and
- 9 roles in our history; and

- Whereas, As a result of growing awareness of Black identity 1 and the contributions of the Civil Rights Movement, Black History 2 Month is a time to reflect on the burdens of racial prejudice and 3 to explore, understand, and appreciate the identities and cultures 4 5 across and within the African diaspora; and 6 Whereas, We pay tribute to, not only the many African-American 7 historical figures in our nation's history, but also the hidden figures that have contributed to American ingenuity and innovation 8 throughout the existence of this great nation, the celebration of 9 10 which has evolved into a month-long celebration of Black progress 11 and power; and Whereas, President Gerald R. Ford officially recognized Black 12 13 History Month in 1976, calling upon the public to "seize the 14 opportunity to honor the too often neglected accomplishments of 15 Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history"; 16 and 17 Whereas, Michigan recognizes the injustices that African-Americans have endured and commends the African-American community 18 for the continuous pursuit of overcoming those injustices, while 19 20 changing the course and nature of history.
