HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.168

Reps. Johnsen, Aragona, Bierlein, BeGole, Rigas, St. Germaine and Phil Green offered the following resolution:

1 A resolution to affirm that the State of Michigan recognizes 2 the importance of and commits to promoting the ethical and

3 responsible manufacturing practices in the production of electric

4 vehicles and solar panels.

5 Whereas, Public Law No. 117-78, otherwise known as the Uyghur

6 Forced Labor Prevention Act (UFLPA), was adopted by Congress in

7 2021 with overwhelming bipartisan support following national

8 concerns regarding the use of forced labor in China's Xinjiang

9 region to produce large lithium-ion batteries manufactured to power

10 electric vehicles, including in the mining of materials by Uyghurs

11 and other Muslim minorities. The federal government also recognizes

12 that polysilicon, a critical component in the production of

1 approximately 95% of the world's solar panels, is produced by these

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- 2 same minority populations. Nearly half of global polysilicon
- 3 production comes from the Xinjiang region. Under the UFLPA, there
- 4 is a rebuttable presumption that any product manufactured in whole
- 5 or in part in the Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region was produced by
- 6 forced labor. The State of Michigan recognizes the inhumane
- 7 treatment of what is estimated to be at least 100,000 Uyghur
- 8 Muslims who are subjected to forced labor in the Xinjiang region;
- 9 and
- 10 Whereas, The use of inhumane labor conditions in the
- 11 manufacturing of lithium-ion batteries is not limited to the
- 12 treatment of Uyghurs in the Xinjiang region. Michigan also
- 13 recognizes that 60% of the world's cobalt production is the result
- 14 of forced labor including oppressive child labor notably
- 15 through cobalt ore mined in dangerous conditions. We recognize the
- 16 inhumane treatment of an estimated 40,000 child laborers in the
- 17 Democratic Republic of the Congo who supply cobalt to China that is
- 18 used in the manufacturing of lithium-ion batteries. The United
- 19 States Department of Labor has also recently recognized that
- 20 "downstream products containing lithium-ion batteries may be
- 21 produced with an input produced with child labor, such as electric
- 22 cars," which we unequivocally condemn; and
- 23 Whereas, In May of 2023, the United States Department of
- 24 Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service issued a notice of
- 25 proposed rulemaking announcing restrictions on the application of
- 26 newly created tax credits for electric vehicles, stipulating that
- 27 starting "in 2024, an eligible clean vehicle may not contain any
- 28 battery components that are manufactured by a foreign entity of
- 29 concern, and beginning in 2025, an eligible clean vehicle may not

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1 contain any critical materials that were extracted, processed, or

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- 2 recycled by a foreign entity of concern." Further, the Department
- 3 of Treasury has proposed interpreting certain provisions of the
- 4 CHIPS and Science Act, Public Law No. 117-168, to define any
- 5 company subject to China's jurisdiction a "foreign entity of
- 6 concern," thereby preventing federal tax credits from supporting
- 7 sales of electric vehicles made with battery components from
- 8 Chinese entities; and
- 9 Whereas, The members of this legislative body condemn the use
- 10 of forced labor in the manufacturing of components and materials
- 11 used in electric vehicles and solar panels, including those sourced
- 12 from Xinjiang, China. In furtherance of that condemnation, the
- 13 State of Michigan affirms its support of the UFLPA and calls upon
- 14 the sister branches of our state government, as well as our federal
- 15 government, to enforce its provisions. We must also strive to
- 16 ensure that electric vehicles and solar panels sold within the
- 17 borders of our state have been manufactured in compliance with
- 18 ethical labor practices and with recognition of basic human rights.
- 19 We recognize the use of forced labor is repugnant and deplorable,
- 20 violates basic human rights, constitutes unacceptable
- 21 discrimination, and damages free and fair competition. It is the
- 22 social responsibility of individuals worldwide to ensure that
- 23 forced and child labor not be used in the production and
- 24 manufacturing of goods and services, which we affirm our commitment
- 25 to today; now, therefore, be it
- 26 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we affirm that
- 27 the State of Michigan recognizes the importance of and commits to
- 28 promoting the ethical and responsible manufacturing practices in
- 29 the production of electric vehicles and solar panels; and be it

- 2 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 3 Governor, the President of the United States, the President of the
- 4 United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of
- 5 Representatives, the Secretary of the United States Department of
- 6 Treasury, the Commissioner of the Internal Revenue Service, and the
- 7 Michigan congressional delegation.
