Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2024-25

General Sections

<u>Executive</u> deletes or revises a number of general or standard sections. The <u>Senate</u> generally restores those sections. This Review and Analysis does not describe those changes and actions in detail. However, Senate added three new sections, described below.

Sec. 251. Priority use of Federal/Private Funds - NEW

<u>Senate</u> directs that General Fund appropriations in part 1 not be expended if federal funding or private grant funding is available for the same expenditures.

Sec. 252. Unenforceable Boilerplate - NEW

Senate requires the department to report on standard boilerplate sections deemed unenforceable.

Sec. 253. Federal Policy Changes – NEW

<u>Senate</u> requires the department to report on federal policy changes that affect department operations, affect industry or other groups, affect current regulations, or create a regulatory gap.

Sec. 302. Contracts and Grants Notification Requirements - RETAINED

<u>Executive</u> deletes section that requires the department to provide notice to the appropriations subcommittees, the House and Senate fiscal agencies, and the State Budget Office of contracts or grants awarded. <u>Senate</u> retains.

Sec. 502. Agricultural Climate Resiliency/Soil Health and Regenerative Agriculture - RETAINED

<u>Executive</u> deletes section that defines Agricultural Climate Resiliency, and Soil Health and Regenerative Agriculture. Senate retains.

Sec. 503 Agricultural Nutrient Best Management Voluntary Practices Program - RETAINED

<u>Executive</u> deletes reporting requirement for work project related to water quality improvement project in western Lake Erie basin. Senate retains.

Sec. 507. Local Conservation Districts - REVISED

<u>Executive</u> retains section that currently requires the distribution of grants to local conservation districts that were in operation in the previous fiscal year based upon criteria established by the department. <u>Senate</u> renumbers as Sec. 601 and modifies to define the new appropriation line item: MAEAP administration and conservation district support.

Sec. 1001. Tariff Economic Impact - NEW

Senate includes new section defining the part 1, one-time appropriation for Tariff Economic Impact.

Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2024-25

Sec. 206. Purchase of Foreign Goods and Services - REVISED

Prohibits department from purchasing foreign goods and services if competitively priced American goods or services of comparable quality are available; requires preference for goods and services manufactured by Michigan businesses and their associated subcontractors and manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses owned and operated by veterans. <u>Executive</u> retains, Senate revises to add subsection requiring preference for goods and services manufactured in facilities that employ union members.

Sec. 207. Disciplinary Action Against State Employees - RETAINED

Prohibits department from disciplining state employees for communicating with members of the legislature and their staffs unless communication is prohibited by law. (Governor deemed this section unenforceable in FY 2024-25.) Executive deletes, Senate retains.

Sec. 211. Legislative Contingency Transfer Authorization - RETAINED

Allows for the legislative transfer process to increase state restricted authorization by up to \$5.0 million. Executive revises to add federal authorization to up to \$3.0 million, Senate retains.

Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2024-25

Sec. 213. Restricted Fund Revenues, Expenditures, and Fund Balances Report - RETAINED

Requires annual report on fund balances, revenues, and expenditures for state restricted funds for previous and current fiscal years.

Executive deletes, Senate retains.

Sec. 220. Internet Posting of Reports - NEW

Requires the department to conspicuously post each report required by boilerplate by the report's due date on the department's Michigan.gov website.

Senate adds new section.

Sec. 221. Receipt and Retention of Reports - RETAINED

Requires department to receive and retain copies of all reports.

Executive deletes, Senate retains.

Sec. 222. Report on Policy Changes Made to Implement Public Acts Affecting Department - RETAINED

Requires the department to report on each specific policy change made to implement a public act affecting the department that took effect during the prior calendar year by April 1.

Executive deletes, Senate retains.

Sec. 223. General Fund Expenditure Restrictions - NEW

Prohibits the department from expending general fund if federal or private funding are available for the same expenditures, requires the department to notify standard report recipients if a reduction in departmental expenditures is necessary. Senate adds new section.

Sec. 224. Expending Available Work Project Authorization – RETAINED

Advises department not to expend appropriations until existing work project authorization for the same purpose has been expended. (Governor deemed this section unenforceable in FY 2024-25.)

Executive deletes, Senate retains.

Sec. 230. Single Grant Recipient Requirements - REVISED

Provides process requirements for grants or projects awarded to single recipient organizations or local governments. <u>Executive</u> deletes, <u>Senate</u> revises to further define eligible grant recipients and requirements.

Sec. 232. State Fiscal Recovery Funds - REVISED

Requires the state budget director to ensure that State Fiscal Recovery Funds allocated under the American Rescue Pan Act of 2021 be expended before 2027; requires the state budget director to notify the House and Senate Appropriations Committees of reallocations made under this section.

<u>Executive</u> deletes, <u>Senate</u> revises to require the department to notify standard report recipients if an SFRF appropriation is projected to lapse.

Sec. 233. Unenforceable Boilerplate Sections Report - NEW

Requires the department to report to standard report recipients on any boilerplate sections deemed unenforceable. <u>Senate</u> adds new section.

Sec. 234. Federal Policy Change Report - NEW

Requires the department to report quarterly to standard report recipients any federal policy changes that affect the department, those that engage with the department, related regulations, or create a regulatory gap with a potential negative public impact.

Senate adds new section.

Sec. 235. General Fund Deposit to Game and Fish Protection Account - NEW

Appropriates \$10.0 million from the general fund to the Game and Fish Protection Account. Senate adds new section.

Sec. 408. Land Transactions Report - RETAINED

Requires detailed report to legislature on land purchases, sales, and exchanges.

Executive deletes, Senate retains.

Sec. 1201. Work Project - Asset Management Solution - NOT INCLUDED

Authorizes unexpended funds for Asset Management Solution totaling \$6.4 million to be considered a work project appropriation and carried forward into succeeding fiscal year; funds will be used to implement a department asset management system.

Executive adds new section, Senate does not add.

Major Boilerplate Changes from FY 2024-25

Sec. 1201. Work Project - Huron Waterloo Pathways Initiative's Border to Border Trail - DELETED

Authorizes unexpended funds for Huron Waterloo Pathways Initiative's Border to Border Trail totaling \$1.7 million to be considered a work project appropriation and carried forward into succeeding fiscal year; funds will be used to develop a nonmotorized Border to Border Trail.

Executive deletes, Senate concurs.

Sec. 1202. Work Project - American Chestnut Restoration Initiative - DELETED

Authorizes unexpended funds for American Chestnut Restoration Initiative totaling \$500,000 to be considered a work project appropriation and carried forward into succeeding fiscal year; funds will be used to study and implement American chestnut restoration and assisted migration of American chestnut or other species for the purpose of helping adapt the state's forests to climate change.

Executive deletes, Senate concurs.

Sec. 1203. Work Project – Mass Timber Market Development – DELETED

Authorizes unexpended funds for Mass Timber Market Development totaling \$1.0 million to be considered a work project appropriation and carried forward into succeeding fiscal year; funds will be used to aid in the development of a mass timber market in this state.

Executive deletes, Senate concurs.

Sec. 1204. Phragmites Management Equipment - DELETED

Requires funds for Phragmites Management Equipment to be used to purchase heavy equipment for managing phragmites.

Executive deletes, Senate concurs.

Sec. 1205. Work Project - Sportsmen Against Hunger Refrigeration Units - DELETED

Authorizes unexpended funds for Sportsmen Against Hunger Disease Testing totaling \$500,000 to be considered a work project appropriation and carried forward into succeeding fiscal year; funds will be used to acquire refrigerated trailers that processors can use to store deer and processed venison.

Sec. 1206. Work Project - America 250 Commission Grants - DELETED

Requires funds for America 250 Commission grants to be allocated to support the America 250 committee; specifies committee composition and selection; outlines committee functions; allows committee to seek additional funding; requires committee to use funding for initiatives to commemorate the semiquincentennial and promote the history and culture of Michigan; requires the committee to establish guidelines and criteria for grants for local initiatives; requires the committee to expend at least \$3,000,000.00 to implement a grant program for local initiatives, at least \$1,000,000.00 of which shall be allocated to the Lake County Merry Makers nonprofit (\$500,000) and Wayne County Community College (\$500,000); defines conditions of grants awards; earmarks \$2.0 million for initiatives that acknowledge Michigan's unique role in the history of the United States and outlines corresponding requirements; earmarks \$500,000 for the Michigan History Center and State Archives; allows the department to retain up to 3% of fund appropriated for administrative costs; authorizes unexpended funds for America 250 Commission Grants totaling \$5.0 million to be considered a work project appropriation and carried forward into succeeding fiscal year; funds will be used to provide grants to state and local entities to commemorate America's semiquincentennial.
