HOUSE BILL NO. 4520

May 22, 2025, Introduced by Reps. Snyder, Rheingans, Mentzer, Wooden, Glanville, Brixie, Breen, B. Carter, Price, Rogers, Weiss, Tate, Steckloff, Hoskins, Paiz, Young, Arbit, Longjohn, Liberati, McFall and Farhat and referred to Committee on Education and Workforce.

A bill to create a program to designate certain campuses at institutions of higher education in this state as hunger-free campuses; to provide for the powers and duties of certain state governmental officers and entities; and to authorize the promulgation of rules.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1. This act may be cited as the "hunger-free campus act".
- 2 Sec. 2. As used in this act:
- 3 (a) "Department" means the department of lifelong education,
- 4 advancement, and potential.

- 1 (b) "Hunger-free campus program" or "program" means the2 hunger-free campus program created in section 3.
- 3 (c) "Institution of higher education" or "institution" means
 4 either of the following:
- 5 (i) A degree- or certificate-granting public or private college
 6 or university, junior college, or community college in this state.
- 7 (ii) A federally recognized tribal college in this state.
- 8 Sec. 3. (1) The hunger-free campus program is created in the
 9 department. The purposes of the program include all of the
 10 following:
- (a) Address student hunger at institutions of highereducation.
- (b) Leverage sustainable solutions to address basic needs onthe campuses of institutions of higher education.
- 15 (c) Raise awareness of basic-needs services offered on the 16 campuses of institutions of higher education.
- 17 (d) Build strategic partnerships at the local, state, and
 18 national levels to address food insecurity among students attending
 19 institutions of higher education.
- 20 (e) Reduce barriers to student achievement resulting from21 basic needs insecurity.
 - (2) The department shall do all of the following:
- (a) Designate as a hunger-free campus each campus of aninstitution of higher education that meets all of the following:
- (i) Establishes a hunger task force that includes
 representatives from the student body and campus administration
 that meets at least 3 times per academic year to set at least 2
 goals with action plans.
- (ii) Designates a staff member responsible for informing

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- 1 students about enrollment opportunities in this state's
- 2 supplemental nutrition assistance program (SNAP) and other
- 3 assistance programs offered by the department of health and human
- 4 services.
- 5 (iii) Provides options for students to utilize SNAP EBT benefits
- 6 at campus stores or provides students with information on
- 7 establishments in the surrounding area of campus where they can
- 8 utilize SNAP EBT benefits.
- 9 (iv) Holds, participates in, or promotes at least 1 hunger
- 10 awareness event per academic year.
- 11 (v) Provides at least 1 physical food pantry on campus or
- 12 enables students to receive food through a separate, stigma-free
- 13 arrangement. A campus may partner with a local food bank or food
- 14 pantry to meet this requirement.
- 15 (vi) Develops a student meal credit donation program or
- 16 designates a certain amount of funds for free food vouchers that
- 17 might otherwise be raised through such a program. Each institution
- 18 of higher education may develop its own procedures for a meal
- 19 donation program.
- 20 (vii) Every academic year conducts a student survey on hunger,
- 21 developed by the department, that is formulated by using best
- 22 practices from the Trellis Research Student Financial Wellness
- 23 Survey. Each institution must submit the results of the survey to
- 24 the department at a time prescribed by the department for inclusion
- 25 in a comparative profile of each campus designated as a hunger-free
- 26 campus.
- (b) Promulgate rules, as the department may consider
- 28 necessary, to implement this act under the administrative
- 29 procedures act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL 24.201 to 24.328.
